The Latest News From Prince County.

Campbell, formerly of this town but for many years past a resident of Council Bluffs, Iowa, writes that he expects to arrive on the 28th inst. with the remains of his brother Sidney who died in the Watkins, New York Sanitarium last February. The interment will be made in the cemetery at Eleanor's.

A friend sends THE GUARDIAN the following items from old papers: In the Spring of 1838, fifteen vessels from various ports were lost on their way out to Quebec, ten of them having sunk or lost in the ice. In all 215 persons were lost. On the 9th and 10th August of the same year the Island was visited by a violent north east storm accompanied by torrents of rain, the effects of which were felt everywhere. In Charlottetown the new Episcopal church was blown down together with several other buildings, besides fruit and ornamental trees. All through the island barns fences and forest trees were blown down, the roads everywhere were stopped by wind falls and it was expected many cattle would be killed by trees. The storm was also destructive to shipping. A brig bound for Newfoundland with lumber was driven on the rocks at Lot 47. She was capsized twenty miles out to sea and then driven ashore. Five vessels were wrecked in the vicinity of St. Peter's and seven others were stranded between Savage Harbor and Big Pond, Lot 44; so far as heard only two lives were lost. The storm and consequent high tide were also destructive along the north shore of Nova Scotia. A Charlottetown paper of Sept. 17, 1833 said that quantities of grain were then uncut but that it looked better than could be expected considering the unusual cold, backward season. Same paper Oct. 1st: "Harvest operations retarded by unsettled weather; a good deal of grain cut but little stacked or secured; oats still uncut in some places." On Oct. 22nd the same paper says: "Grain not all housed yet while patches are standing and unfit for the sickle. Oats in brisk demand at 1s. 6d. (24 cts) to 1s. 8d. (27 cts); barley 3s (48 cts)". By an item in the same paper it would appear that in Cape Breton things were even worse than in Prince Edward Island. The paper says: "We understand the president authorized supplies to be forwarded to settlers in Cape Breton who suffered most severely by the failure of the crops." It seems the early part of the season (1833) was quite mild and vegetation looked prosperous, to be followed later by frequent cold rains and ungenial weather.

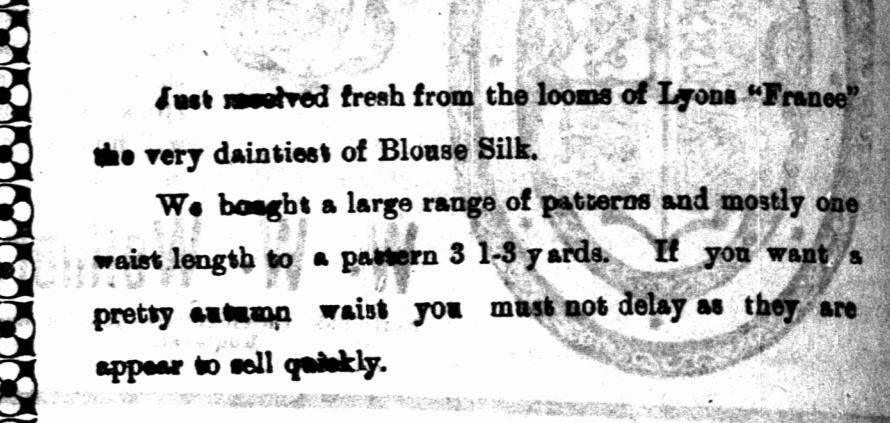
