[SPECIAL BY WIRELESS] Buenos Ayres, May 8.—A despatch from Montevideo published here today announces that the French transport steamer Porton from Marseilles, April 6 for this port, has been wrecked off the coast of Uruguay. One hundred of the passengers and crew are said to have perished.

GRAND TRUNK SECURING FIVE THOUSAND MODERN FREIGHT CARS

Considerable additions are being just now made to the rolling stock of the Grand Trunk, in the delivery of some five thousand freight cars of various kinds. These cars were only ordered last November, and delivery started a few days ago, which is regarded as pretty rapid work in these days of enormous orders for rolling stock, far beyond the capacity of the shops to turn them out. The cars are of the most modern type as is shown by the immense capacity of the steel coal cars, which have a carrying power of 100,000 pounds each. The cars are being rushed into active work as fast as they arrive, which is about 30 a day. The order which is now being delivered consists of: 1,000 steel coal cars of 100,000 lbs. capacity. 1,250 box cars of 60,000 lbs. capacity. 1,500 flat cars of 60,000 lbs. capacity. 3,000 single deck stock cars of 60,000 lbs. capacity. 200 double deck stock cars of 60,000 lbs. capacity. 300 ballast cars of 100,000 lbs. capacity. 400 refrigerator cars of 60,000 lbs. capacity.

THE IRISH COUNCIL BILL IS READ IN THE COMMONS

It Provides a Council of 107 Members, Two Thirds Elective, With Control of Eight Departments. Balfour Calls It Unfair, Radicals Disappointed, Redmond Disposed to Accept.

[SPECIAL BY WIRELESS] LONDON, May 8.—Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland, introduced the Irish Council bill in the House yesterday.

Compared with the Home Rule bills of 1885 and 1893 the measure confers little self-government upon Ireland, merely giving to the Council control of eight departments, now managed by the Government boards. The Council is to be appointed by the Crown and while the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland is given power

to nullify its measures, the Crown retains control of five of the eight departments, including the constabulary.

The control of this branch always has been a thorn in the flesh of the Irish people. The Council as proposed will have 107 members, 82 of whom will be elective. The bill does not wholly meet the approval of any political parties. The Unionists regard it as a step towards Home Rule. Radicals are disap-

pointed because it falls so far short of Home Rule. The bill passed its first reading by 416 to 121.

Mr. Balfour claimed the bill was unfair, while Mr. Redmond said he would not give a deliberate or final judgment upon it till he had time to consider it. He said if the measure showed itself "workable," even with moderate success he and his party would adopt it. A Nationalist convention will be held soon to consider it.

IN BRIDE'S SIGHT KILLED BY AUTO

BOSTON, May 8.—A huge red touring car containing four men, and going at the rate of 40 miles an hour, struck Frank E. Neelham 20 years old, at Lexington, as he was alighting from a car near his home at Dow street, East Lexington, last night, killing him instantly. The machine did not stop after the accident, and in the confusion that ensued the number was not noticed.

He married last November Miss Annie Wilson of East Lexington. His wife was at home awaiting his return when the accident occurred within sight of her.

THREE MEN ASPHYXIATED

MONTREAL, May 8.—Jas. McGowan, 40 years old, Jas. McGillik, 60 years old, and Thos. Biddle, aged 30, were asphyxiated at their boarding house, 342 St. James Street, sometime during Saturday night. They were Englishmen employed in Peck's Rolling Mill, and occupied one room. The gas had been in full blast, hence the sad end of the trio of strangers.

SUPREME COURT OF QUEEN'S CO

The application of William Kennedy of Summerside, to quash a conviction for breach of the Prohibition Act was heard yesterday for noon, and part of the afternoon. The point in question is whether the prosecutor in such a conviction case who is also a constable, can save the conviction.

In the present case Kennedy was served with a summons by Gough, the Prince County prosecutor, who is also a constable. Kennedy did not appear at the return of the summons and he was convicted in his absence.

Mr. Johnson appeared for Kennedy, and Mr. Gaudet acted for Gough the prosecutor. Judgment was reserved.

GIRLS WANT TO LOOK PRETTY

TORONTO, May 8.—The report of the factory inspectors for Ontario, just issued contains the remarkable statement by a female inspector that some girls refuse to dress their hair as directed by the act to dress their hair in the machinery. They prefer the risk of being scalped, she reports, to sporting their locks. Six hundred and thirty-six accidents, twenty-seven with fatal results, occurred in Ontario factories during the year.

Judge Winchester and C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture for Ontario, have been appointed arbitrators to decide the dispute between the milk producers and the retailers, and the milk famine from which Toronto has suffered for three or four days will be ended tomorrow.

KING LEOPOLD'S MISSION FAILS

PARIS, May 8.—Absolute confirmation has been secured by the Associated Press of the complete failure of the mission of King Leopold of Belgium to Paris, which was indirectly designed to secure the support of France against Great Britain in the matter of the Congo-Independent State, by inducing a French financial institution to convert the Congo debt hypothecating for that purpose the railroads and other franchises of the Congo to the French Government.

COULD NOT LIVE WITH TRAITOR

St. Petersburg, May 8.—The funeral of Mme. Mroczka Baradina, a well-known revolutionist, who committed suicide abroad, aroused the greatest interest in revolutionary circles on account of her romantic history.

Mme. Baradina was the daughter of a rich manufacturer of good social position, and left her home to engage in the revolutionary propaganda.

A few days ago Mme. Baradina accidentally opened a letter showing that her husband was a traitor, who had successfully planned the arrest of an important group of terrorists, and even proposed to bring his wife back to Russia in order to deliver her into the hands of the police. The police advised him to delay the latter step in order to avert suspicion.

Mme. Baradina, after reading the letter, took poison. Her body was brought to St. Petersburg, and was interred here Tuesday, the coffin being buried under circumstances of crimson flowers.

ANOTHER SLAP AT GERMANY

PARIS, May 8.—Official confirmation has been given by the Associated Press of the report that negotiations are in progress between France and Japan looking to an understanding mutually guaranteeing the political and commercial interests of the two powers in the Far East.

The conference on the subject has been going on in Tokio and are proceeding harmoniously, but some time will probably elapse before they are concluded. France recognized her possessions in Indo-China and Siam, as well as her commercial interests in the Far East, would be vulnerable in the event of war and deemed it wise to conclude an arrangement with Japan, which is willing to guarantee French interests in return for the recognition of the Japanese claims in Korea and Formosa.

THAW'S HOUSE IN PITTSBURG

Found to be Mortgaged For One Hundred Thousand Dollars, Great Secrecy Being Maintained and Record Book Was Hidden Away.

MARVIN BOY'S BODY FOUND

DOVER, Del., May 8.—Lying in a marshy land the body of little Marvin, son of Dr. H. N. Marvin, whose mysterious disappearance from the Bay Meadow farm near Dover, has baffled since March fourth was found half a mile from the Marvin farm by Ollie Pleasanton a farmer.

The child lay face downward in a patch of meadow grass. There was no mark upon the boy's body indicating foul play. It was in a good state of preservation suggesting that it had been frozen. Pleasanton says he found the body a distance of twenty feet from where gunners had passed often before. The spot where the body was is mid-way between the Marvin home and the Delaware River. When Pleasanton came upon the child's body he found the clothing intact. His tiny woolen reefer was buttoned up securely about the body and not an article of clothing which he had on was missing.
