ESCAPED UNDER FIRE.

BUFFALO, Jan. 20.—Frank F. Daniels, 20 years of age, an alleged deserter from the Army Engineer Corps, made a successful break for liberty under fire of the guards at Fort Erie early today. Daniels was arrested eight weeks ago, and brought here to await trial. Last night he was put to work in the furnace room of the barracks. He made the dash for freedom under the eyes of the guard who fired several shots at him. Daniels dodged among the post buildings and escaped in the darkness.

MIGRATING STOCKBROKER ARRESTED FOR FRAUD.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20.—Patrick Joseph Kirwan, a stock broker of Dublin, Ireland, arrested upon his arrival here yesterday, will be arraigned late today before a United States commissioner. The warrant issued at the instance of A. Carnegie Ross, British consul-general, charges Kirwan with embezzlement and fraud. The complaint specifies that Kirwan sold stock for a client about Jan. 1, and realized the equivalent of \$1,104, which he appropriated.
