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BUTTERS COUCH APPLE PIE

1/4 cup brown sugar 1 deep, uncooked, nine inch pie shell 6 to 8 medium apples 3 tablespoons brown sugar 1 tablespoon butter 1 tablespoon mild-flavored fat 3 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk Sprinkle 1/4 cup brown sugar over the bottom of the uncooked pie shell. Peel apples and slice thinly, fill the pie shells heaping apples slightly in the centre at Cream 3 tablespoons brown sugar with the fat and the flour until well blended. Crumble the mixture over the top of the apples. Pour the milk into the pie and bake in a hot oven, 400 degrees F until top is brown and apples are tender about 45 minutes. Cool and serve.

This phase of the industry—from the local assembling point to the consumers' frying pan, on the hoof and in carcass form—was interestingly pictured in story and actual photographic exhibits by the speaker after which a number present expressed their approval, stating they had learned many things of which they had not been previously aware.

Ellerslie Men Get Contract For Ice

The contract for 2,700 tons of ice for use at the Charlottetown and Borden yards of the Canadian National Railways has been awarded to Mr. Leslie Weeks and sons, Ellerslie. The contract will mean employment for 20 men for a period of about 35 days.

In order to load the ice aboard freight cars at Ellerslie the construction of a ramp about 240 feet long has been built. The width of the ramp will enable teams to drive up to the car doors in order to unload.

The ice is loaded aboard sleds at the Ellerslie pond by means of a conveyor operated by a 2 H. P. engine. The sleds are loaded at an average speed of one a minute.

at members of Parliament take immediate steps to bring about this local innovation and province wide necessity. In the meantime it was felt that present methods of feed importation could reasonably be relied upon until such time as Island livestock production and estimated feed requirements had so increased that advance importation and storage was not only advisable, but an obligation we could not afford to neglect.

DAYLIGHT SAVING

Another subject that occasioned much discussion, was that of relationship between country and city people, and how that relationship can be of mutual benefit when the rights of each party involved are respected by the other, or on the other hand, how detrimental it may prove to be, when despised by either or both of the parties concerned.

"Daylight Saving" was quoted as an instance illustrating the point in mind in the alternative situation mentioned. A resolution disapproving of this practice of "changing time" moved by Mr. Roland Beaton was unanimously passed.

Speakers taking part in the discussion declared they were not concerned about what hour of the day or how many days in the week merchants and business offices in Charlottetown or other urban centres ceased to do business, but they did object to having public services, transportation schedules, and other public utilities, operating in the interest of all the people dislocated and disorganized at the behest of a minority vote of the citizens of the province. And furthermore, the Premier of the Province would be expected to make good his promise to deal authoritatively with this matter at the coming session of the Legislature.

It was recalled that it was at Winsloe the first move was made

towards establishing a system of organized marketing of hogs—selling at a premium over hog—elsewhere in Canada, the producer receiving the benefit. Winsloe farmers today are equally on the alert and important developments may be expected as a result of the meeting held last Friday night.
