THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Jan. 11.—The feature of the export trade in grain here Saturday was the increased demand for Canadian spring wheat from foreign buyers. Some sales of No. 1 Northern were made at \$1.99 per bushel, No. 4 wheat at 8 cents per bushel under the Winnipeg May option, and No. 5 wheat at 15 cents per bushel under all C. I. F. Bay ports. There was a slight improvement in the demand for oats, and the undertone was firm. Ontario No. 2 white beans quoted at 66 cents, No. 3 grade at 64 cents and No. 4 grade at 62 cents per bushel, ex store. Owing to the high prices ruling here for Spring wheat grades of flour, little business was transacted with United Kingdom on Saturday. The local trade was quiet. Extreme dullness marked the trade in winter wheat flour but prices were well maintained. The millfeed market was without any new feature to note. The demand for rolled oats continues steady and prices were firm. The volume of business in eggs in a wholesale jobbing way was large and the tendency was steady. The butter market was quiet. The export trade in cheese continues inactive. The tone of the market for current receipts of fodder made good demands very firm with No. 1 grade quoted at 18 1/2 to 19 cents per pound, and No. 2 grade at 17 1/2 to 18 cents per pound. Crop beans were quoted at \$2.70 to \$2.80 per bushel.

(Continued From Page 1) majority of churches in favor of Union, anti-unionists are not alarmed, as they only point out that many of these are simply preaching stations with congregations in scores of cases numbering less than twenty.

At a meeting tonight it was appointed out by Dr. MacGillivray of Guelph that of 22 churches reported to be in favor of union in the Presbytery of Ottawa, the combined members of these congregations would not make up one good city church.

In the city of Hamilton eight Presbyterian Churches have defected Union, and three have sustained it. Two churches voting there, night decided against Union.

New Church in Regina The following message has been received from Regina by the Presbyterian Church Association: "At a largely attended meeting tonight, it was unanimously agreed to continue, a Presbyterian Church in Regina. It will have at least 500 members. Services will be held next Sunday in the City Hall. Committees are appointed to effect permanent organization. Steps are being taken to appoint four Provincial Presbyteries in Saskatchewan."

In the total vote of the Toronto churches reporting last night there was a majority against Union. The Unionists claim that this is an unfair comparison. They state that the Union side of the question has never been presented in any one of the five Toronto churches that voted against Union last night by overwhelming majorities.

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 11.—The first set back received by the Cape Breton advocates of Church Union came when the returns from St. Paul's Church, Glace Bay, Rev. Dr. D. M. Gillies, Pastor and St. Andrew's Sydney Mines, Rev. Dr. F. Scott Mackenzie, Pastor, disclosed overwhelming majorities against Union. The vote in St. Paul's, Glace Bay, stood, 22 for and 218 against, and at St. Andrew's, Sydney Mines, the count showed 59 for a 265 against. Both pastors were strong opponents of Union. Dr. Mackenzie being one of the foremost anti-Unionist speakers in the Province.

Warden Church, New Aberdeen, Rev. J. C. MacLellan, Pastor, voted into the Union column by a vote of 84 for and 20 against.

HALIFAX, Jan. 11.—Following the announcement of the vote on organic Union in three Halifax churches a meeting of Presbyterians was held yesterday, at which a resolution was unanimously passed to proceed immediately to take steps looking to the organization of a new Presbyterian congregation in the city. A Committee was appointed to find a suitable place for holding worship and if this can be arranged either in a church or a hall, it was stated last night that the first service would be held on Sunday morning, Jan. 18th. Definite announcement, it was stated, would be made as soon as the arrangements were completed.

Although it is also to be remembered that though Sir Wilfrid Laurier had his Imperialistic moments there was no one more coy than he when it was a question of tying however loosely the hand of Canada or of committing her to precise formal political entanglements. The very fact that all parties agree that his is not the time for an Imperial constitutional conference speaks for itself, though neither the Imperial or the Dominion Governments are satisfied with the present position which is often highly inconvenient and might easily become dangerous.

But the Dominions are highly reluctant to face the alternatives because though their loyalty to the Empire is beyond question their sense of Dominion nationhood is the stronger still and they fear Imperial entanglements and commitments. This hesitation is natural because the Dominion are immersed in their own problems, but the fact remains that the solution of this problem is one of the urgent needs of Empire if the present unity is to remain.

(Continued From Page 1) throughout the Empire to give close attention to these problems lest a big opportunity be lost and perhaps irretrievable damage result to the Empire's structure.

An historically Conservative newspaper such as the Morning Post says: "The United Kingdom, once, under the old colonial system, was desirous to shed her colonies, but has now become dependent upon her Overseas Dominions precisely as the Dominions in another sense are dependent upon the United Kingdom and upon one another."

That shows how the Empire spirit has become a living thing on this side of the water. The same paper brings into the limelight some of the dangers when it says "Canada and Australia are so rich in natural resources, so thinly populated, that peoples of other countries naturally desire to share in that wealth and even control its production. Australia is well aware of the aspirations of her Eastern neighbors. The United States perceives in the vast forests and fertile plains of Canada, a means whereby the American people can replenish their own wasted and wasting resources."

MUST STAY IN EMPIRE. After reviewing the Canadian geographical situation and the commercial east and west trend, the paper adds "to reverse the policy and abandon the east and west Empire trade in favor of a north and south policy would lead inevitably to a fusion with the United States. The separation from the Empire of which there is talk in Canada today—would lead to exactly the same end. Canada can be a strong independent nation in proportion, and only in proportion as she is associated with the other nations of the Empire."

The Morning Post adds most significantly "we do not believe that the policy of the Canadian Government tends toward separation but its tenor has undoubtedly aroused some uneasiness in this country." The Post makes its confession of faith in the Empire and pays tribute to the work of Borden, Baha and Smuts and concludes that it is natural enough that in comparatively quiet moments men's minds and thoughts should turn to separatism or to subtle plans for meeting dangers which in reality do not exist.

But the practical genius of the British Empire and British people is too strong to permit the Empire which has rendered such service to the world to be dissolved, as a result of the caprice of either wreckers or theorists.
