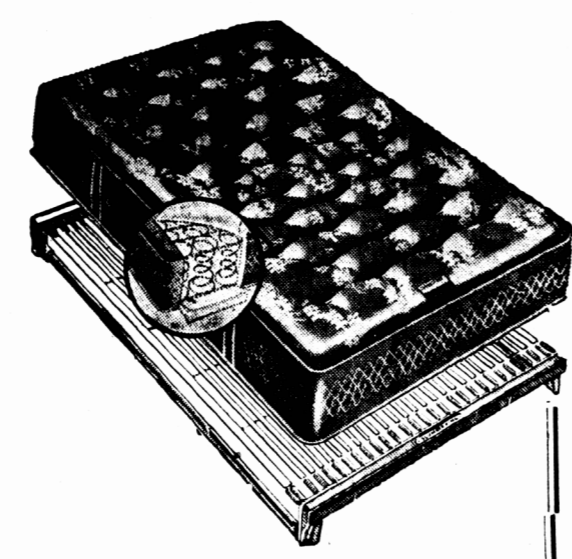
Miss E. Hooper read the paper on Drama and there was some discussion.

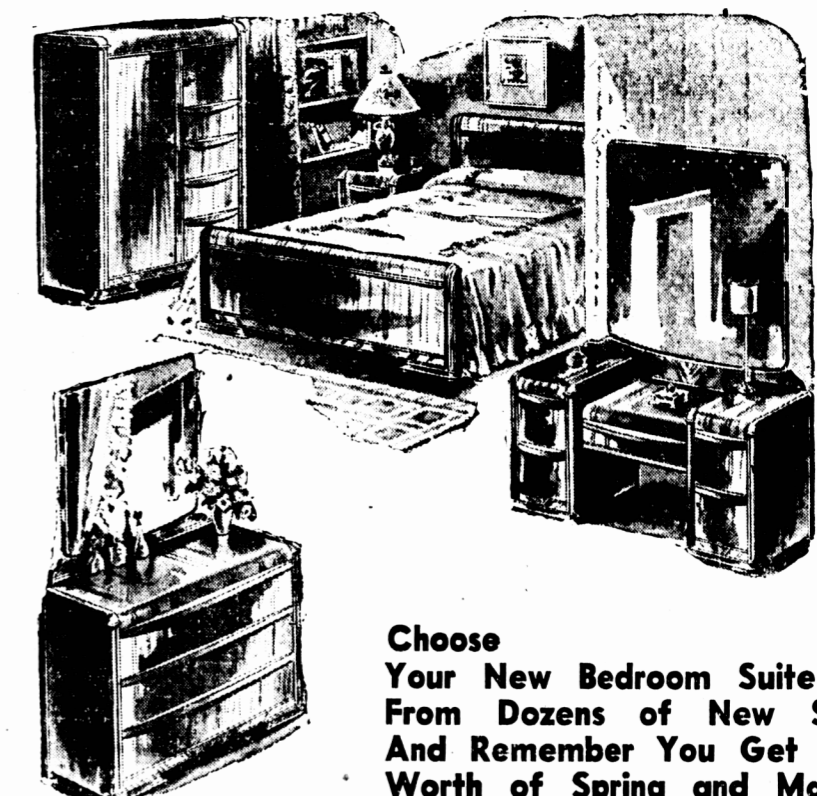

C.N.R. Appointments Are Announced
MONCTON, Nov. 2 — E. C. Matthews has been appointed division engineer, Edmundston Division, with headquarters at Edmundston, N. B., succeeding J. P. Mackenzie,

deceased, and H. A. Fuller has been appointed assistant engineer maintenance of way Atlantic Region, with headquarters at Moncton, N. B., succeeding Mr. Matthews, charge from military service, Mr. Matthews resumed his service with the railway at Truro, transferring to Halifax in November 1936. In October 1938 he went to Edmundston as instrumentman and in June 1939 returned to Halifax in the same capacity, where he remained

until October 1933, when he severed his connections with the railway. In October 1934 he returned to the railway service as secretary in the Engineering Department at Moncton. From July 1936 to May 1938 he served as draughtsman and instrumentman, and in April 1940 was appointed rail inspector for the Atlantic Region. In January 1942 he became assistant engineer

maintenance of way at Moncton. Harold Aberdeen Fuller was born at Farnham, Que., and entered the employ of the railway at Truro in November 1913 as draughtsman. In October 1915 he transferred to Cochrane, Ont., as transitman and instrumentman and the following year enlisted for military service. Upon demobilization he returned to the railway service as

instrumentman at Bridgewater, N. S., in June 1919, and in 1921 was promoted to senior instrumentman. From Bridgewater he went to Halifax in November 1923 and in May 1927 was appointed third assistant engineer at regional headquarters in Moncton. In November 1927 he was appointed second assistant engineer, June 1941 acting assistant engineer maintenance of way and in December 1942 office engineer.
