THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 13.—American cold storage hold'rs on December 1st. were 3,780,000 cases and poultry storage hold'rs amounted to 6,742,000 pounds. Eastern turkey markets continue to show firmness. American markets are also firm and New York reports that a price advance is expected over the week-end.

Toronto unchanged. Storage stocks getting low. Poultry receipts heavy, dealers offering for 12 pounds 38 to 39, 9 to 12 pounds 37 1/4 under 9 pounds 31.

Montreal turkeys prices are holding firm on the recent advance. Several cases Western Canada stock have already been received. Pro-cessed western offerings are around 12 to 13 for specials and 2 cents less for No. 1's. O. B. shipping point mostly Manitoba stock re-ceived to date and it is meeting with the approval of local buyers. It is generally accepted here that Western supplies are less than last year. Local offerings appear quite light. Winnipeg jobbing fresh ex-tras 70 to 72, firsts 58, to 60, seconds 55, storage extras 46, firsts 42, seconds 34, pullets extras 67, firsts 73.

Edmonton and Calgary, unchanged. Vancouver jobbing fresh extras 58, firsts 56, seconds and pullets 34.

THE OWL WAGON DE LUXE

By McAlister Coleman. Some forty years ago, Patrick J. Tierney, a young fellow from New Rochelle, sought shelter from a storm in Worcester, Massachusetts, inside a contraption that was a distinct novelty to the New Eng-landers of those days. It was the great-granddaddy of all "dog" wag-tons, this Worcester affair no more than a portable counter over which sandwiches and coffee were sold. Every night its owner would har-ness up his horse and drive down to a vacant lot past which workers were wont to go. Midnight would see his Cinderella-like disappear-ance.

There was something in the idea that captured the imagination of the young New Yorker and he went back to New Rochelle to start a wagon business of his own. Before long, he was operating three wagons in various parts of the town, and at different hours of the following shifting paths of trade. He was cook and dish-wash-er, counter-man and proprietor in those days with an easy air of camaraderie about him that brought him more and more cus-tomers. By 1895 Tierney had branched out so that he and his helpers were operating thirty-five wagons and the business was rapidly becoming stabilized.

I find that now the term "lunch wagon" has been officially abandon-ed by the trade and that the more elegant "dinner-car" has tak-en up the traces of the Dinner-car Revolutionists. At length I com-am upon their headquarters a mile outside of the suburban town of the factory of P. J. Tierney Sons, of New Rochelle, N. Y. There in with great banging and clattering, a crew of workers were turning out the huge, tiled, steel-jacketed cars that are so rapidly driving the antique "owl wagons" from the streets of our cities. Four cars were being built at once inside the workshop and outside stood a monster just completed, a four-ton by forty foot beauty, one of the largest dinner-cars in the world, starting on its trip to a Mid-Western city under the auspices of a tenton towing truck.

My eyes opened again when I learned that the average cost of such a car is \$7,500 and that some dinner-car operators make annual profits of as \$15,000 a year. Almost overnight a new in-dustry has come into being.

Wonderful Work Accomplished By The Bible Society

(Canadian Press.) TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 10.—Stories of heroism paralleling the best missionary traditions were revealed in the reports of colportage in distant and lonely outposts of the Dominion, which were made at the annual executive meeting of the Canadian Bible Society here re-cently. Far up the shores of the St. Lawrence to the Labrador Bibles were carried; in the lumber-ing districts of Ontario and on the great plains of the west among peoples of alien speech.

During the past year more than 400,000 copies of the Scriptures in many languages were circulated in Canada by the Society, which has for its purpose the wider circula-tion of the Scriptures to every man in his own language, without notes or comment in the same pe-riod more than 9,000,000 Scriptures were circulated in China by com-bined Bible society effort, almost one-half by the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Reports were also made to the meeting on plans for the increased usefulness of the society in the leadership of the young life of Can-ada.

The meeting was attended by representative Christian leaders from the Atlantic to the Pacific. There were present Revs. Principal Smith, Vancouver; Arch Ward Sas-katoon; W. J. Southern, Winnipeg; Prof. Anderson, London, Ont.; Prin-ciple O'Mara, Toronto; A. C. Ter-nells, Montreal; Dr. H. E. Thomas, Sackville; and Rev. H. D. Raymond, Charlottetown; and Messrs. T. C. Margaret, London; Thos. Mortimer, Toronto; Dr. F. H. Gishens, Ottaw-a, and the General Secretary, Rev. W. B. Cooper.

Denmark Regaining Its Normalcy

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, Dec. 10.—The economic life of Denmark is slowly but surely adjusting to the normal con-dition with the Danish Krone at par. During the month of October the increase in the value of the Danish Krone was continued, al-though, owing to a short relapse in the rate of exchange during the early part of the month, the aver-age quotations in October were 35.51 compared to 25.45 during Sep-tember.

Official figures of Denmark ex-ports and imports during Septem-ber show an export surplus of \$500,000. For the whole period of January 1 to September 30, the import surplus was \$20,500,000 compared to \$27,500,000 for the same period in 1924. On the other hand Danish export figures were maintained almost on the same level as last year due to increases in quantities. Exports of agricul-tural products in October were somewhat less than September. The prices obtained in the foreign markets for Danish agricultural products during October were ra-ther uneven. Prices for butter and eggs were considerably higher than in September whereas prices of bacon and cattle declined.

Warrant Out For Former Minister

EDMONTON, Alta., Dec. 11.—A warrant for the arrest of George P. Smith, former Minister of Educa-tion in connection with fraudulent printing charges, was issued today and will be executed by the city police in regular course on the ar-rival of Mr. Smith, who is now on his way to Edmonton.

Mr. Smith was Minister of Educa-tion in the government of Hon. Charles Stewart, who relinquished office when defeated at the polls in 1921, when the Farmers' Govern-ment was formed in Alberta.

The issuing of the warrant fol-lows a royal commission investiga-tion here into the methods of the former Liberal regime in the hand-ling of government accounts during 1921. The inquiry, which concluded last night, concerned mainly a \$5,829 transaction with the Esdale Press, Limited.

CHICAGO'S FIRST DOUBLE DECKED STREET NEARING COMPLETION.

CHICAGO, Dec. 12.—Chicago's first double-decked street is near-ing completion as a \$3,000,000 hardware plant, the last building in its path, gives way to a wreck-er gang.

When completed the street, lo-cated on the south-bank of the Chi-cago river, will be known as Wack-er Drive and will represent an ex-penditure of \$20,000,000 for the one mile of its length.
