Great Showing By Canadian Rifle-men At Bisley

P.G. Martinson, Of Three Rivers Wins Stock Exchange Match To Give Canada A Major Victory.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HAMILTON, July 15.—A prim, bespectacled university graduate, in appearance not at all like the usual conception of a champion rifleman, P.G. Martinson, of Three Rivers, Ont., won the stock exchange match at Bisley, England, today. The match, which was the first of the series, was won by Martinson with a score of 148, two short of the world record.

Martinson's achievement brought the Canadian team its first major victory since the meet started the day after last week. He started the match with a perfect 50 in the first stage of the stock exchange, 80 yards in the Daily Mail, the second stage, he dropped to 49 and had the same score in the 600-yard Wimbledon Cup to win his first aggregate.

The match brought Martinson a stock exchange trophy and \$50, the other Canadians also shared the money prizes. Company Major George Emslie, who had three 49's to obtain an aggregate of 147, got \$30. Emslie, veteran of the Toronto 49th Rifles, has been shooting in competitions since the Great War. Major Instructor J. Trainer of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, and Sgt. James Borland of the 48th Highlanders each earned an aggregate of 145.

R.D. McLeod of Saint John, N.B., got \$20. He had 49, 50, 50, and 50. Sgt. E. G. Stock of the Queen's Own each won \$5. McLeod had an aggregate of 144, with 49, 50, 50, and 50.

The Daily Mail competition was won by McLeod with a score of 80. Sgt. Stock and Corporal H. L. of the Royal Canadian Air Force, Vancouver, were eliminated under a new rule, which forces those having perfect scores at the end of the regulation number of shots to fire three more rounds. McLeod fired the extra three and ran his string of bulls to 13.

Taylor and Stock, Martinson and McLeod fired the extra three and got \$12.50, while Martinson and C.Q.M.S. Alec Parnell of the Montreal Black Watch were awarded \$10 and Lieut. Dow, Lieut. Johnson of Wayne, Alta., Emslie got \$5 each.

The tie will be fired Tuesday as will the tie in the Times event. Martinson and Taylor got into the Times shoot-off with 13 bulls apiece and will face 15 other competitors. In the Times Capt. A. C. Lucas of the Queen's Own won \$10 with a score of 50, although he fell by the wayside on the three extra shots. Scores of 49 brought \$5 each to Stock, Emslie, Parnell and Borland. Similar amounts went to Trainer and Lieut. H. W. Steeves of the 8th Field Battery, Moncton, N. B.

It was announced that Capt. Lucas had won \$10 in the Donegal match, fired last Friday at 200 yards. He had 49, one under perfect. In the same match Borland, also with 49, got \$5.

The Duke of Cambridge 900-yard match fired yesterday resulted in a tie in which W. Barber of the Royal Navy, Sergeant J. Hutchinson of All Hallows Officer's Training Corps and Sgt. L. Sakey of the Ordnance got \$30. Lieut. R. A. Sweet of Hamilton, Ont., and Sgt. Stock won \$10 in the events with scores of 49 and 48 respectively, while R.Q.M.S. R. G. Hamilton of the Grenville Regiment, Ottawa, won \$5 with a 47.

The four-man team of H. M. E. Excellent won the Belgian Challenge Cup fired in conjunction with the Stock Exchange event.

LARGE LIST OF ENTRIES FOR NORTHAM

Keen Competition Expected In All Four Classes On Wednesday.

Jimmie Milligan has scored a distinct success with his classes for next Wednesday afternoon, July 18th. The four have attracted forty entries, an average of ten to the race. Selection is ever so local, not only that but the competition in all classes is excellent and the racing is therefore sure to be of a high order.

The grounds and appointments will be as usual perfect or near perfect so that everyone who attends is certain of an afternoon of rare sport. A few words regarding some of the entries will not be out of place.

2.14 Pace. This will have the redoubtable Lucky Lindy 2.12 and his stablemate Mac Volo 2.12 1/4, with their old barn companion of years ago, Billy Cope together with Star D. 2.09 1/4, Patrick Direct 2.10, a horse that by the way took his record over Northam track last year, Truxie Volo 2.13 1/4, Hush 2.10, Doctor Medium 2.09, Winnie Winkle and the redoubtable Betty S. 2.07 1/4, who has been cleaning things up at Truro and North Sydney. There may be two or three without walls but there is certain to be a fighting field.

The 2.15 Trot. This will be the first appearance on a Maritime track of Lusty Prisco 2.07 3/4, who has been gamely and gallantly running the Bay State and Northern Vermont circuits last year. It is sound this year and is just about in top form and ready to meet Helen D. 2.14 1/4, that we predict will be one of the real tough trotters of the year. Others that will be right in the limelight are Kitty McKane 2.16 1/4, Miss McTyre 2.15, Captain Cope 2.14 1/4, who made such a good showing in Summerside, and Golden 2.12, who is by no means passe. Added to the above competition will be that sterling race horse Frank J. Ortolan 2.13, Addie McGraw 2.12, High Toby 2.11 1/4, and Bessie Hamlin 2.16 1/4. A few withdrawals in this race won't spoil the excitement a bit as there is a wealth of material to pick from.

The Three-year-old Trot and Pace. This is more or less of an uncertain race although on recent performance Mignonette, owned by Dr. F. W. Christopher looks to be the goods. However, there are others and there is no telling how the field may mix up. Balbo, Belle Aubrey and Signal Senator are well regarded by their owners or they would not have entered so far away from home.

2.28 Trot and Pace. One would naturally expect this race to have the largest entry list but not so. Eight have answered the call and with Baronet 2.13 1/4, record taken at North Sydney recently, the pick, but there are others who are expected to give him a race such as Silver Doctor, Roy Volo Jr., Clancy Tipton, Miss Worthy Douglas, etc. Following is the complete entry list with owners names:

Well - balanced Track Force Will Represent Canada

Favorites Tumble But Records Stand At Conclusion Of Empire Games Trials.

(By Elmer Dulmage, Canadian Press Staff Writer, By Guardian's Special Wire) HAMILTON, July 15.—Canada's track and field team for the British Empire Games, a contingent that failed to break a single open record in two days of trials here, stood 29 strong tonight with athletes on the roster from five provinces. The team sailed for London Thursday from Montreal.

It may not be the strongest track force Canada has sent abroad but most observers conceded it to be a well-balanced squad, stronger than usual in the field events and in the distance running division.

The west provided the field strength, producing four Canadian champions who won berths.

The selection committee announced the team early today, many hours after selecting J. Haley, Trail, B.C., had scored for British Columbia in the high jump and closed out two days of campaigning that saw favorites tumble on all sides before the rush of a dazzling group of lesser lights.

Chief among the beaten were Bert Pearson, blonde Hamilton Olympic sprinter who had things all his own way for three seasons on Canadian tracks. For the second time within 24 hours Pearson bowed to the finishing drive of Bill Christie, racy, confident Toronto Achilles A. dashman who collared the mythical "sprint king" title for the first time by adding the 220 yards championship to his triumph Friday at 100 yards.

Christie, who was caught in 22.2 seconds for the division, went to the top of the sprinting. Pearson, sixth and last in this classic final, was named along with Allan Poole of Kelowna, B. C. and Frankie Nicks of Halifax mostly because of fading Hamilton star had placed second in the century on Friday.

Pearson's selection left Ontario with 18 places on the team. The Nicks and Roy Oliver of Calgary, both captured positions. Nicks, third in the 220 final and Oliver took second to Lloyd Longman of Toronto in the six miles.

British Columbia won five places and Quebec three. George Sutherland, fair-haired giant from Calgary who is one of the best all-round runners in the country, became the only Prairie athlete to make the grade when he won the 16-pound hammer throw after showing prominently in all the other weight events and the running hop, step and jump.

The marathoners, Harold Webster, Dick Wilding, Alex Burnside and Percy Weyer, were selected several weeks ago and the selection committee approved their positions today. Christie's fine 220-yard victory over Poole and Nicks featured the Saturday programme. A crowd of 5,000 held fond hopes that Pearson, regarded as the greatest Canadian sprinters developed in Canada, would gain revenge for his defeat in the 100. They saw the fleet foot-head, no longer in command, outfooted badly all the way.

It was a battle between Christie and the sturdy Poole, British Columbia's first top-notch sprinter since Percy Williams retired. Nicks made a brilliant recovery in the last 100 yards to get into third place, a yard behind Christie. The Toronto ace went into the straight-away leading by a full yard but barely managed to get home inches ahead of Poole.

Far back in the race, never a contender, was Pearson. Frank Simpson of Montreal and Andy Zuzis of Toronto placed ahead of the favorite.

Montreal stars took complete possession of the middle-distance affairs when Jerry Sampson won the 880 yards trial to match Les Wade's triumph on Friday at the mile. Sampson ran second to Phil Edwards, British Guianan veteran who was entered by Hamilton Olympic Club with the understanding he was trying only for the Canadian title. Edwards will represent his native country at the Empire Games. Sampson was four yards behind Edwards whose time was 1:56. Addison, Victoria and Bob Mitchell, youthful Toronto high school runner, provided Sampson with the stiffest opposition.

Slow Times At British Track Meet

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WHITE CITY STADIUM, London, July 15.—British track and field officials tonight faced the task of selecting a team to battle for the homeland in next month's British Empire Games, and they faced it without any great reason for cheerfulness.

Members of the team will be picked from those who placed yesterday in events of the British Amateur Athletic Association's track and field meet at this Stadium, it was the most part in races and results in many field events that have been exceeded in other years.

What was expected to be the feature race of the meeting turned out otherwise as Jack Lovelock held the world record in the mile, ran that distance in 4:26.6, to take an easy win over the Britishers, S. Wooderson of Blackheath and J. Cornes of the Achilles Athletic Club who were second and third respectively.

Lovelock, apparently not driven to his best, speed finished easily, six yards ahead of Wooderson. Lovelock, a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford University, will run for his native New Zealand, not for the United Kingdom.

Finest sprint of the day was that of a foreigner, J. Sir of Hungary who took the 100-yard dash title to his country with a victory in 9.9 seconds, beating out A. Sweeney of the Micoarican Club. C. Berger of Holland came third.

Berger, last year's 220-yard champion, lost that title which went to R. Murdoch of Glasgow University in 22.1. Sweeney led the reserve to catch Murdoch, but finished ahead of another Scotsman, I. Young of Edinburgh University, who was third.

Brilliant Victory By Cavalcade

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) CHICAGO, July 15.—Mrs. Isabel Dodge Sloane's Cavalcade basked tonight in new glory, his three-year-old achievements climaxed by a brilliant victory in the \$35,000 added Arlington classic.

At the three-year-old son of Langcote—Hastily swept past the judge's stand, the conqueror of Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt's Discovery for the sixth time, the crowd was on its feet cheering him on while "Uncle Mack Garner, astride Cavalcade, took a quick look over his shoulder to make sure that he was safely in front.

Half a length back of Discovery was Hadagal, the entry of Warren Wright of Chicago, with Riskulus, the California challenger owned by Norman W. Church of Los Angeles, three lengths back.

The race at a mile and quarter was the fastest Cavalcade has ever run. He covered the distance in 2:02 4-5, a full second off the track record set by Sun Beat in 1931.

Cavalcade earned \$30,325 by his victory, bringing his total winnings to date, both as a two-year-old, to \$126,965. Cavalcade already had won \$80,911 this year, and his victory made him the leading money winning thoroughbred of 1934.
