DRINK AND THE COMMUNITY
Some striking statements made by Lady Astor in a B. B. C. national broadcast debate a few months ago are worth considering. She said: "I was brought up in a temperance household, far from it—and personally I don't consider myself by nature or disposition a teetotaler. But I've seen drink kill so much, wreck so many homes and break so many parents' hearts that I feel it a duty to deny myself a beverage which is poison to so many. I've seen drink take the life out of the body and I know, so often from my own experience, that I don't think I'm the only person who feels that way, nearly every social worker in the world feels that way. You see, it's not the drink itself that is the trouble, it's the effect it has on thousands of lives. I've seen the devastating effect that drink has on social conditions—not only in social conditions but in all sections of society; there's hardly a home, there's hardly a family that's not touched with it."
