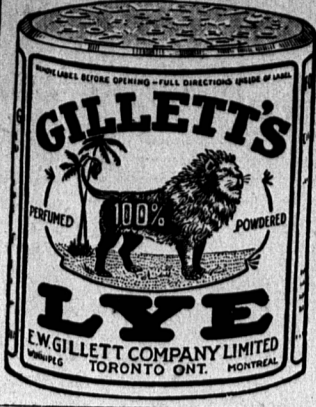

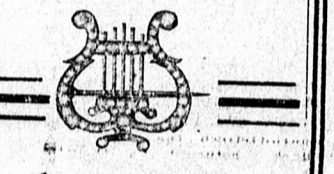
THE METHODIST CHURCH.—The financial district meeting of the Charlottetown District will be held at Murray Harbor on Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 2nd and 3rd. The first session will be on Tuesday evening at 7.30 when a sermon will be preached by the Rev. H. A. Brown, of Vernon River, followed by the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. On Wednesday morning the meeting will commence at nine o'clock.

MOTOR BOAT RACE.—The tea and motor boat race held at Pinette on Saturday, August 23rd 1913 was certainly a great credit to the Pinette Boating Club and it is anticipated that next year it will be one of the biggest events of the season. About 450 people were present and lined the South Bridge and shore to see the start. There were only two classes owing to the lack of 10 h. p. boats. The 5 h. p. race was called off at 2 o'clock, 7 boats made the start and went over the course twice. The Marion M., owned by Messrs John McRae and Neil Morrison came in first, 3 minutes ahead, Lady Mac, owned by Mr. Sinclair McRae came 2nd, 2 minutes ahead, Sheddadle, owned by Messrs J. J. MacDonald and Baxter Hubley 3rd, 1 1/2 minutes ahead, Mary L., owned by Wm. Jenkins and Clarence Gillis 4th, 1/2 minute ahead, P. D. G., owned by Donald Cartilo and John McDonald 5th, 1 minute ahead of Shrubh who did not get a good start and thus got her entrance money back. The three horse-power race resulted as follows:—Victor, owned by Simon Murchison 1st, 2 minutes.—Laurier, owned by Donald McKinnon, 2nd, 3 minutes ahead of R. L. Herden owned, by Jonny Stewart. The Marion M., was a great credit to the builders and they should be congratulated on their success of the first speed-boat on Pinette River, the is of the Viper type and covers about 12 knots per hour with a 5 h. p. Imperial engine. J. McDonald was the starter. After the race, the dancing stand was crowded, music furnished by Mr. Dan McLeod, and the Merry-go-round was a great amusement for the young folks. Drinks and Icecream was sold on the ground. The time broke up about 9 o'clock which ended one of the pleasantest outings of the season.
