**CRANBERRY PICKING IN NATIONAL PARK** — As will be noted from an advertisement appearing elsewhere in this paper the season for the picking of cranberries in the Prince Edward Island National Park has been set for October 1st. It is not generally known that the area included in the Prince Edward Island National Park abounds in all types of berries including raspberries, blueberries and cranberries. In previous years cranberry pickers have invaded the park area early in the season and in many cases have destroyed the crop before it was charged for the privilege of picking berries and the National Park authorities are desirous that patrons cooperate with them in this matter so that a larger crop and more satisfied patronry shall be the rule this year. It might be advisable for those who desire to pick berries in the Park that they should get in touch with the Superintendent Mr. E.A. Smith at Dalvey House and Tracadie, who is in a position to impart information concerning the crop to them.

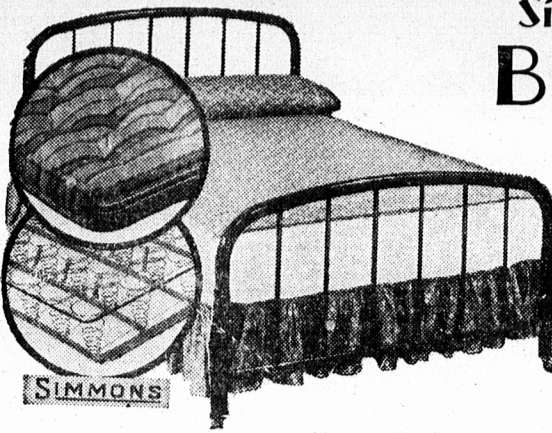

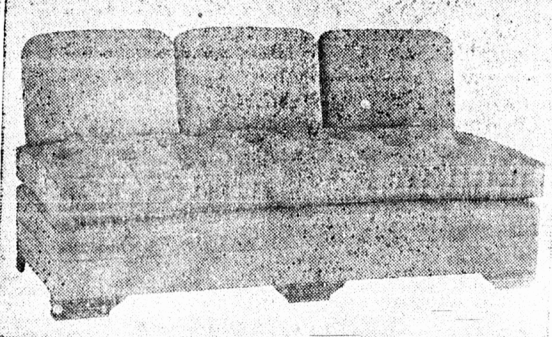

## Teachers Urge Larger Unit Of Administration

At their local convention held at Mt. Stewart, Aug. 28, the school teachers of the community passed a resolution requesting the Department of Education to organize and operate during the coming year one larger administrative unit. Teachers present showed splendid co-operation and enthusiasm in giving reports of devices they used, ten teachers taking part.

Supervisor Woolner stressed the importance of good questioning in class work, and urged the teachers to strive for better attendance among their pupils. Miss Hilda Gillis demonstrated the value of film slides in teaching, pointing out inadequacies of present text book methods, and offered demonstrations to schools hearing such.

The President, Mr. Rego McDonald, in his report made interesting references to his trip to Hamilton as a C.T.A. delegate. He then appointed as committees: Resolutions, Neil McCannell and Ruth McEachern. Question Box: Aubrey Hughes and Bernadette McDonald. Nominations: Eileen Morrissey and Agnes Coffin. Press: Angus Gilmore and Mary O'Brien.

**War Contributions**

Mr. Woolner spoke on the oldest device of teaching — the question and answer. He pointed out that even Christ and Socrates used this method. After emphasizing that the teacher notice and use the pupils' assisted by Supervisor Hynes a well-

questions, the Supervisor went on to show that the teacher's questions have four functions: to test the pupils' knowledge; to emphasize facts which the pupil has already learned; to bring up new material and motivate the discussion, and to make the pupil think. Types of questions are "yes or no" type, the alternative type, the fact questions, and the thought producing question, the last two types being of more value than the first two.

In conclusion, Mr. Woolner gave the general suggestions that questions be worded carefully and not repeated; that the question be given before the pupils name; that considerable time be given for answering questions requiring thought, and that pupils be encouraged to ask questions. He cautioned against questioning too rapidly calling too much on the brighter pupils, rotating the questions, making vague suggestions and using book phrasing.

**Afternoon Session**

At the afternoon session, after instructions had been given on the course of studies and text books, the teachers enjoyed three films on the subjects, Norway, the Crusades, and Treasure Island, with comments by Miss Hilda Gillis of the P.E.I. Libraries. The value of this type of "Visual Education" clearly presented itself, and Miss Gillis heartily recommended and encouraged its use, adding that, although it is not the wish of the authorities to enforce the method, demonstrations would gladly be given upon request.

The Question Box, in charge of Mr. Aubrey Hughes, dealt with difficulties in the curriculum, text books, school law, etc., which were answered by Supervisor Woolner.

Resolutions brought in by Mr. Neil McCannell, endorsed, in addition to the larger administrative unit, the government's attempt to raise the standard of attendance. The Department's program re War Savings Certificates, the continuation of the P.E.I.F. executive's campaign for increased salaries, and further recommended that school trustee Boards be required to give 30 days' notice to a teacher whom they do not intend to re-employ.

Before the meeting closed, the new president, Mr. Angus Gilmore was conducted to the chair.
