Funeral Of Late Rev. A. N. Gillis

The funeral of the late Rev. Angus N. Gillis was held yesterday afternoon leaving the McLean Funeral Home, King Square, at 3.15 for Trinity United Church where the funeral services were held and thence to the Peoples Cemetery.

The pall bearers were, Rev. E. M. Aitken of Cornwall, Messrs. Sydney Green and J. Lester Douglas of Charlottetown, and Messrs. MacKay, Hill and Coffin of Truro.

The services at the church were conducted by Rev. Dr. Ramsay, with whom Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Rev. E. M. Aitken, Rev. J. H. A. Anderson, Rev. A. W. Robertson and Rev. H. Johnson were seated on the platform.

Rev. E. M. Aitken in his address spoke as a classmate and personal friend of the late Mr. Gillis and referred to the work of the deceased as a student, as a soldier in the great war and as a minister of the Gospel.

At Prince of Wales College, Mr. Gillis proved himself a diligent and capable student. It was during his course there that he formed the purpose of dedicating his life to the Christian ministry. After leaving Prince of Wales College he enlisted in the Tenth Siege Battery and did his part in the great war. On his return to Civil Life he entered Dalhousie University, took his degree of Bachelor of Arts and then followed the course of theology in Pine Hill College. During the summers he served in the mission fields of the Presbyterian Church. In 1922 he graduated and was licensed to preach. His first charge was Waterville, Nova Scotia. There he was united in marriage to Miss Jessie Creighton of Pictou, who was a young children survivor. After a brief ministry at Waterville, he was called to Malpeque where he laboured zealously in the cause of the United Church of Canada. A little over a year ago he was called to St. Andrew's Church, Truro. Five years from his ordination and his life is ended. It brings to mind the short earthly ministry of the Master whom he served so faithfully.

Rev. J. H. A. Anderson in his short address spoke of the common sorrow, shared by his native province, the Presbytery of Truro, and especially St. Andrew's Church here, and his own home; the common loss and the common grief; the common comfort to whom all that mourn for him may look for consolation; and the common call to service that comes to young men who should press forward to take the places left vacant by the death of such as he, and to all of us to strive forth the qualities of love, service and consecration which distinguished the life and career of Mr. Gillis. The Presbytery of Miramichi was represented by Rev. A. W. Robertson who voiced the great sorrow felt in New Brunswick and in the several fields of work in which Mr. Gillis had served.

He brought a message from Rev. G. A. Christie, who had been a fellow presbyter with Mr. Gillis in this province, expressing regret at being unable to attend the funeral. Mr. Robertson made special reference to the kindness of Mr. Gillis to those who were in trouble, and to his great helpfulness whenever help was needed.

Rev. F. E. Boothroyd of York and Rev. D. M. Grant, Mr. Gillis' successor at Malpeque, also took part in the service, the former reading the lesson and the latter leading in prayer.

When the casket was borne into the church it was met by the pastor and other members of the Presbytery, and carried to a position in front of the pulpit where Chopin's funeral march was played. At the close of the service a large number viewed the remains, and they were then carried to the waiting hearse, while the organist rendered the Dead March in Saul. RUNCORN WILL ARRIVE IN THE CITY THIS EVENING

Western Battler Fresh From A Decisive Win Over Alberta Boxer Will Go Into Training Here Tuesday For His Bout With Jack McKenna.

Never in the history of boxing in the Maritimes has there been such interest and dynamic enthusiasm attached to a championship fight as is manifest at the present time over the coming middleweight fight between Harry Runcorn of Moose Jaw and Jack McKenna of North Sydney, Cape Breton. Never has there been such rivalry and conjecture throughout the rank and file of the entire Maritime sporting fraternity. The majority of the mainland press will be represented at the ringside; many moguls of Eastern Canadian sport world will also grace the scene in close proximity to the squared circle where two of Canada's greatest middleweights will pit all cunning, stamina and ring-generalship against each other in what is expected to be the hardest fought and flashiest fight between middleweights that has ever been staged in Canada. Charlottetown will not only be represented in the gathering that night, but every village and town throughout the Island will have its fans in that cheering and blasé throng. The mainland too, both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia fans have wired for reservations in order to be assured of seating accommodation at the ringside.

Champion Will Arrive This Evening The following telegram was received by Mr. H. A. Ebers from Jimmie Bennie, manager of Runcorn: Montreal, Que., Oct. 29, 1927. H. A. Ebers: President, Sports Club, Charlottetown, P. E. I. Arrived Montreal, Runcorn good condition. Will arrive Charlottetown Monday. JIMMIE BENNIE.

The first four rounds were a pretty battle, with Bulger meeting out his share of punishment, and springing from the ropes with agility, which at times fooled even the flashy Runcorn and it was a toe to toe battle for these rounds, with honors about even. However, Runcorn started the fifth in top dog fashion, and it was curtains for Bulger about a minute after the fifth canto opened. The boys weighed in Saturday afternoon, with tipping the scales around the 160-pound mark, or the middleweight limit.

DRUMHELLER, Oct. 24.—Harry Runcorn of Moose Jaw, easily the best middleweight ever seen in action in Drumheller, knocked Charlie Bulger of Castor out in the fifth round of their scheduled 10 round bout. Saturday night, at the Drumheller Arena, a right cross to the jaw carrying Bulger right through the ropes to the ground, where he was counted out by Referee Roddy McDonald. Runcorn prepared his opponent for the knockout with some terrific body punishment, as well as working his famous left to the face, and then performed what Firpo did to Dempsey, and worked in a right smash to the jaw that even the ropes failed to stop Bulger as he fell practically in the lap of the ringsiders.

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LOS ANGELES, Oct. 29.—Eddie Long, manager of Bud Taylor, Terre Haute, Ind., bantamweight announced today that an offer received from Tex Rickard, New York promoter, of \$20,000 for a featherweight championship match in the eastern city, December 5th, between Taylor and Tony Canzoneri, would be accepted.

Taylor should fight Canzoneri, will be stepping out of the bantamweight class.

SALESMAN WANTED (Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 30.—The export business in grain here Saturday was of the usual weekend character and the market was quieter. In sympathy with the renewed strength in oat futures at Winnipeg, a firmer feeling prevailed in the local market for cash grades, but no actual change in prices was announced. Prices for all grades of spring and winter wheat flour were well maintained under a moderate demand. The undertone to the market for all lines of millfeed was steady and inquiry was fair. There was no change in standard grades of rolled oats for which the demand was moderate. The exports of baled hay from the port of Montreal for the week ending Oct. 27, 1927 were 22,134 bales. Saturday's trade was fair and values were unchanged. A further falling off in fresh egg receipts at practically producing point in Canada has now brought the situation to a point where storage eggs form perhaps the bulk of the trading in Montreal. The trade in all storage grades was fair Saturday. receipts were 193 cases. The demand for all grades of butter continued inactive but prices softened no further change. The receipts were 1,182 packages. The United States demand for cheese was again good and a moderate amount of business was transacted. The local and English inquiry was quiet. The receipts were 5,663 boxes.

VANCOUVER—No change in this market. Dealers are quoting producers extras 46-47, firsts 40-41, pullers 33-35.
