

Legionaire Squad Win Semi-Final Series

Goodwin's Blow In Ninth Inning Is Deciding Factor

Joe Goodwin's looping single over short right centre in the ever short ninth scoring Williams and McInnis Sunday afternoon outplayed the Legionaires into the City Baseball League finals against the northern Rowers, the blow winning a 4-3 defeat on a hard fighting game of Anchors in just as exciting and dramatic a finish as a local baseball encounter has furnished here in years.

Deadlocked in a scoreless battle for eight full innings with Charlie Ryan of the Anchors hurling one hit ball to that point and Lefty Strain of the Legion hurling three strikes, the Legion team apparently had the encounter sewed up as they piled three unearned runs across the plate to take a 3-0 lead but the fate willed otherwise.

The first Legion batter was struck on an error; the next hitter struck out to ease the strain but Strain, getting a life when his pop foul hit by a pitched ball to put the leg runs on and went to second unassisted. McInnis hitting for McKenney topped a roller down third and Ryan attempting to tempt Strain at third saw both runners safe as his throw to third was late. Williams lined a grounder to LeClair at third with the Anchor struck saccer making Jay but his throw to first was just a shade late for the double killing as Strain scored to make it 3-2.

The stage was set for Goodwin's series winning blow. With a count of two and two he hit his looping drive into short right centre to score McInnis and Williams and end the encounter.

The eighth left eight men stranded during the encounter filling the bases in the second inning only to have McAleer come through in the clutch to hold the Legion from then until the ninth scoring chances were few and far between for both squads.

The ninth started out tame enough when Anchor's hitter grounded out. Hennessey started the ball by beating out a bunt for a base hit; Stanley singled for his second hit of the game; Chipman struck out to make it 3-2 down but young Phil Murphy who had come through with a sparkling catch off Jay in centrefield in the seventh dumped a short fly into left field that Strain the Legion outfielder dropped to send two runs across Murphy scoring himself as an infield error on LeClair's grounder kept the rally going. McAleer snuffed it out however by forcing Burke to pop out to Williams.
