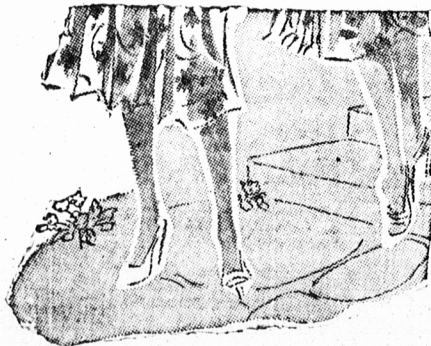

JAMES U. CAMPBELL, STATE SUPREME COURT JUSTICE DIES IN SALEM, OREGON

James U. Campbell, member of the State Supreme Court and former Chief Justice, died in a Salem hospital, July 16, at the age of 71, following a heart attack, suffered ten days previously, after an automobile trip to Southern Oregon.

Born on August 29, 1866, on Prince Edward Island, Canada, and a graduate of the Prince of Wales College there, he came in 1888 to Oregon City, where he studied law. He was admitted to the bar in 1893.

His career as a public official began in 1900, when he was appointed deputy district attorney of Clackamas county, serving until 1904. He served two terms in the state legislature, beginning in 1907 and in 1909 he was named circuit judge of the fifth judicial district, Clackamas county, by Governor Frank Benson, serving in that capacity until 1930, when he became supreme court justice.

P. E. Island Mayor of Waltham Mass. to Resign

WALTHAM, MASS., Aug. 24—(CP)—Canadian-born Dr. Frederick MacDonald, chief executive of Waltham for the last four years, today announced he would retire from his Mayoral position and devote his time to his profession.

The prominent physician and former Tufts College professor has served two two-year terms. Today he told reporters he felt he had served the city as long as he could without neglecting his medical career entirely.

The New Glasgow, P. E. I. native, expressed a desire to retire at the end of his first term, but a petition signed by hundreds of Waltham citizens induced him to run a successful election.

Today's announcement came as an answer to a delegation of 200 representative Waltham businessmen and citizens who two weeks ago asked if he intended to run again. His negative decision leaves former American Legion State entrant in the mayoralty race, Commander John H. Walsh sole although other candidates are expected to run.

MacDonald visited his Maritime birthplace last summer.
