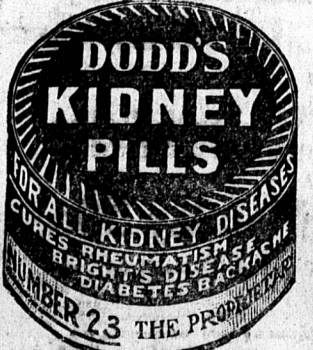

CONTINUED DISPUTES STOP SHIP-BUILDING.

(Canadian Press.) BELFAST, IRELAND, July 29.—Owing to the continued disputes between the Orangemen and the Catholics over the Home Rule agitation which has resulted in many Catholics being prevented from working the shipbuilding firm of Harland and Wolfe has already closed down some of its departments. It is announced today by the firm that it will be unable to continue departments which will ultimately result in the whole of the works stopping unless the disturbances are diagnosed.

EIGHT PERSONS IN AUTO ACCIDENT.

(Canadian Press.) TOLEDO, OHIO, July 29.—Six persons were killed, two fatally injured and another hurt when the Lake Shore and Michigan Central train struck an automobile containing nine persons this afternoon at Alexis, about 120 miles from here. Among the dead are Rudolph Cousineau, aged 30, farmer, Lasalle, Michigan, Eva Navarra, aged 20, daughter of James and Mrs. Navarra, La Pleasant, Michigan; Mrs. LaFayette, Cousineau, aged 30, of Lasalle, Michigan.

DANISH EXPLORERS RETURN HOME.

(Canadian Press.) COPENHAGEN, July 28.—Capt Bjnar Mikkelsen the Danish explorer and engineer Svendsen, both of whom started in 1910 to cross Greenland have arrived at Aalesund. Capt Mikkelsen and his companion reached Denmark Firth, May 20, 1910, where they found records left by Eriksson.

They began the return journey nine days later and encountered terrible hardships. Several of the dogs died and the explorers were compelled to shoot those remaining for food.

They reached Shannon Island, opposite King William Land, on November 29 and remained there throughout the winter and following summer, hoping to be picked up by a whaler.

No vessel came and they proceeded to Shannon Island where they spent the following winter. In the spring of 1912 they endeavored to make a sled journey to Cape Dalton, but had to give it up owing to weakness.

They had abandoned all hope of rescue when they were picked up by a Norwegian fishing vessel on July 17 last and brought to Aalesund. They will start shortly for Copenhagen.

NOVASCOTIAN MILLIONAIRE DEAD IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, July 28.—John S. Lyle, ninety-four, and childless, is dead in his home, Springwood, at Tenly, N. J. He is said to have left a fortune of \$30,000,000 to \$40,000,000, much of it in New York city real estate, in which he began to invest half a century ago. He was born in Nova Scotia and at ten years came to this city. He became an office boy in Lord & Taylor's dry goods store. When he retired from that concern ten years ago, he was a leading stockholder.

Mr. Lyle's first wife died in April, 1907, and in September, 1910, he married Miss Julia G. Hannon, a trained nurse, who attended him during an attack of pneumonia.

FOUND GRAVE IN POTATO PATCH.

BRIDGETOWN, July 27.—No small degree of interest was taken in a report that came to the ears of The Herald correspondent today, and the authenticity of which is fully vouched for. A manufacturer doing business west of Middleton, has purchased a strip of land recently nearby to a graveyard. In running out the lines proper care was not taken and part of the whole plot was staked off. The whole plot was plowed up and planted to potatoes. Some relatives of the deceased lady that was known to have been buried in the vicinity, came home a few days ago, and paid a visit to the spot where they felt sure the grave was. It is not easy to imagine their horror when the parties became convinced that the resting spot of a loved one was found to be in the middle of a potato patch. One of the ladies present burst into tears and sobbed. This is an outrage. The matter is being kept as quiet as possible, but may lead to further notice.
