MAGISTRATE'S COURT—Two Prohibition Cases are before Magistrate R. S. Hinton in Summerside this week in which an important part of the evidence against the accused (who is the same party in both cases) was gained by means of binoculars. In one case Const. Leo Lauman, R. C. M. P., testified to watching a certain premises from an office in the court house building with binoculars and seeing a man approach the accused and hand him something which he believed to be money. The two men then fled, pursued from view and he immediately in company with Sgt. Watson and Const. Davis proceeded to the vicinity and searched a man who had two bottles of moonshine in his possession. In the other case, Const. F. Curtin gave similar evidence. A truck drew up and he claimed that the accused approached it then went to a clump of tall grass and took two bottles from it and brought them to the house and searched the man and found a bottle of moonshine in his pocket. Later this party was called as a witness and he said he purchased the liquor from a man who was driving a truck. He was convicted on a charge of driving to the common danger and fined \$100 and costs. A man intercepted on the highway with 13 gallons of moonshine in his car was fined \$1500 or 3 months under the Excise Act and \$500 or 4 months under the Prohibition Act. It is understood that his car was placed in the pound and the driver was fined \$100 and costs and for failure to report an accident a party was fined \$25 and costs.

BRITISH OFFICERS TO BE TRANSFERRED

NEW DELHI, Aug. 28 (CP)—When India's new constitution comes into force, those regular British officers of the Royal Canadian Army or the Indian Army of 20 years' service or under at that date who do not wish to continue to serve as such or whom the Indian government do not wish to transfer to the Royal Navy and the British Army respectively. Subject to their individuality they will be absorbed by those services to the maximum extent possible. Those who cannot be so absorbed or who do not wish to transfer will be entitled to compensatory benefits. The British officers of over 20 years' service who, on the introduction of the new constitution, do not wish to continue to serve in the Royal Indian Navy or the Indian Army or whom the Indian government do not wish to retain.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 28 (CP)—Students of the University of Manitoba's school of interior decoration are learning the principles of color and design in a movement to bring new grace and beauty to private homes.

Professor John Russell, head of the school, hopes to see his pupils decorated in a good, contemporary style of decoration that will bring a new color to the dwellings of western Canada. Already, graduates of the course, now in its eighth year, are designing home interiors, store displays and aircraft interiors.

In all classes, the emphasis is on beauty and usefulness. Interior decoration is not simply a matter of hanging tinsel on a Christmas tree. Professor Russell tells his students, "Every item in a room must be planned for its contribution to the total effect for its comfort, for its usefulness."

"Usefulness is the test of modern decoration and furniture. That doesn't mean that everything except modern furniture. Periodic furniture can be combined with contemporary types into a pattern suitable for living today."

The smock-clad students—nearly all of them women—start off with primary lessons in color, shapes and forms. Later, they build cut-away models of houses, and for their graduation they do a series of sketches of a complete home.

Professor Russell emphasizes that well-harmonized interior decoration is not just for high-priced homes. In fact, he says, it will probably find its greatest usefulness in the four-room dwellings now mushrooming all over Canada.

Newsman Take Selves Apart

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (CP)—Newspapers will talk themselves apart and see what makes them tick in a new venture which gets underway here Sept. 30—the American Press Institute.

Working newspapermen will thrash out their problems, exchange ideas and try to arrive at conclusions helpful to the profession as a whole.

Thirty-eight United States publishers have put up more than \$150,000 to ensure continuance of the institute for two years.

There will be six seminars, each lasting two to four weeks with attendance at each limited to 25.

Managing editors and news editors meet Sept. 30-Oct. 18; picture editors Oct. 28-Nov. 8; city editors Dec. 2-20; editorial writers Jan. 20-Feb. 14; reporters of municipal affairs March 10-28; general reporters May 5-23.

Subjects to be discussed by managing editors and news editors give an idea of the range:

Newspaper relations to civic planning and the future of the community; newspaper crusades for civic improvement; relations of newspapers to charitable organizations and other groups of a service character; newspaper and the world of science; coverage of labor news; coverage of news which (directly or indirectly) concerns race or religion; public interest in various types of news; readability of news stories; relations of newspaper and picture services; relations of newspapers and pictures services; news versus interpretation; 3 p.m. editorial; editorial composing rooms (with emphasis on avoiding overlap); news room supervision of copy; standards to be used in hiring employees; newspaper ethics; newspaper libraries; practical methods of obtaining libel, facsimile reproduction; radio as an ally and a competitor.

There is a grim bit for general reporters: "The Reporter versus the Copy Desk."

Women Barred

The Institute is an affiliate, for administrative purposes, of the Columbia University School of Journalism, with Floyd Taylor, professor of journalism at Columbia, and editor of the New York Herald-Tribune, director, and Claude A. Jagger, on leave from The Associated Press, associate director.

"We are said Mr. Jagger, 'hope to try to do an exchange of information and ideas between editors and reporters from all over the country.'"

"We are purposely trying to bring conflicting points of view so that each study the questions from all angles."

"There is no academic requirement for admission. Requirements are five years' experience on daily newspapers and nomination by a publisher or principal executive of all classes—'including former newspapermen'—and no academic diplomas or certificates."

STRIVE TO BRING BEAUTY TO HOMES

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SPEAKING TRICKS TO CORRECT

EDMONTON, Aug. 28 (CP)—Few people realize what they preach, but Mrs. Bertha Briggs, Edmonton radio station, she has taught the correct voice production, enunciation and pronunciation to many during her last 10 years in the profession.

Mrs. Briggs says the most interesting part of her job is in trying to bring out the personalities of individuals through their speech.

Reviewing of all radio scripts before they go on the air and rehearsal of news broadcasts with announcers are her main tasks. This is done particularly where announcers are most likely to strike unfamiliar phrases and where an "unhappy" announcer often makes mistakes.

There are few persons in Canada doing this type of work, Mrs. Briggs says, but there is a wide field opening up. "The basis of good speech is the desire to interest others in one's own special 'hobby' alone," she says.

"With proper training, almost everyone can learn to speak so effectively and correctly. This is one of the things that makes the work so interesting."

Mrs. Briggs formerly gave many of her pupils instructions in several languages since she speaks French, German and Italian.

A speech characteristic she finds hard to correct in pupils are idiosyncrasies; tricks in speaking that have grown up with the individual.

RICH ISLANDS AID DAIRYMEN

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Aug. 28 (CP)—New Zealand's production of dairy produce will be greatly assisted by the resumption of phosphate shipments from Nauru and Ocean Islands two rich phosphate islands near the equator, which were captured by the Japanese during their advance in the Pacific.

From the enormous deposits of first grade phosphate on the two islands about 1,250,000 tons were shipped every year before the war. Farming economy in both Australia and New Zealand rested very largely on extensive use of this phosphate as fertilizer to keep the pastures in good condition and permit heavier carriage of stock.
