CONDUCTOR GEORGE STANLEY HENNESSY

The death occurred at his home, 266 Fitzroy St., Charlottetown, Oct. 17, 1946, of George Stanley Hennessey. He was born July 20, 1887 at Cape Traverse, son of Lawrence Hennessey and Margaret, nee Hennessey. He was a veteran of the 10th Battalion and enlisted in 1915 in the 10th Battalion and went overseas in 1916. While in France, he received the Military Medal for bravery in the field. After returning home, he was employed as brakeman on the C.N.R. and later was a conductor for a number of years before his retirement. He became ill in July, 1943, and was a patient in the P.E.I. Hospital for several months. He then returned home, he was unable to get better, and he was able to be up and around for a time, but had to enter the hospital in the fall for treatment. When he returned home, he was able to be out around until January of this year when he took a further relapse. He was a patient sufferer until his death, never complaining, and always with a smile for his many friends when they called to see him. His pastors, Rev. T. E. MacLennan and Rev. Dr. Rice visited him often during his long illness. He was always glad to see them and got great comfort from their visits and prayers. He was a member of the Methodist Church in Tryon and was a faithful member while there. He then moved to Charlottetown with his family and had his membership transferred to Trinity United Church. He was a member of the Board of Stewards for a term. When his health permitted, his place was seldom vacant in the church. He was a kind and loving husband and father, and his faith was never shaken, his trust in his Redeemer never faltered all through his long illness. All that the best medical skill could do and home love and comfort so tenderly given to lessen his suffering failed. He leaves to mourn his wife, nee, Eliza May Thomas of North Tryon, and three sons, Harry Raymond, Earl Stanley, Vernon Wendell. One son, William Thomas, predeceased him June 7, 1944. He leaves four sisters, (Annie) Mrs. Con MacMillan, Vancouver, B.C.; Mrs. Eva Gillis, Edmonton, Alberta; (Beulah) Mrs. Thomas Campbell, Madison, Wisconsin; Ella, New London, Wisconsin; and one brother, Louis, Greenfield, Wisconsin. DEMOCRATIC PARTY STRENGTH IN U. S. REACHES LOWEST POINT IN 16 YEARS

Five Separate Poll Indices, Indicate Public Reaction Against Party In Power By American Institute of Public Opinion

PRINCETON, N. J., October 29 — Democratic Party strength throughout the nation has reached its lowest point in 16 years. That was the situation in the first week of October, one month before the election. Whether the same situation will prevail at the time of the election, future surveys will indicate.

This serious trouble which the Democratic Party faces is shown in five continuing surveys on five separate and important aspects of the political situation. While each of these trend studies deals with entirely different factors, they each have a bearing on the campaign and they all point in one direction—to a definite and nation-wide trend away from the Democratic Party.

This trend was of such major proportions in early October as to indicate Republican control of the House if the election had been held then.

Here is what the five different continuing surveys show on these five aspects of the political situation. The index of Congressional voting sentiment is based on the question:

"If you were voting for Congressman today, would you be most likely to vote for the Democrat, the Republican or the candidate of some other Party?"

All who classified themselves as independent voters were asked how they plan to vote in the Congressional election Nov. 5, and also what party they would favor if a presidential election were being held. Their party preferences for Congress are 41 per cent Democratic, 50 per cent Republican. As for preferences in a presidential race, the following table gives the recent trend of sentiment among independent voters, with their vote in the 1944 and 1946 elections for comparison.

The vote of those expressing an opinion: Democrats can handle problem better 49%, Republicans can handle problem better 60%.

Prior to the 1944 presidential election a similar poll found that among people expressing a preference for one party or another as best able to handle the issues uppermost in their minds, 56 per cent chose the Democratic party, 46 per cent the Republican party.

Defence Plans Approved By Commons

By JAMES MCCOOK (Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Oct. 31 — (CP Cable) — The House of Commons today approved without a vote defence plans outlined in a recent government white paper after A. V. Alexander, new defence minister, said there must be sufficient military forces available for the British Commonwealth to "hold a situation" anywhere "in the Commonwealth until United Nations forces could arrive to assist."

Key figure in the United Kingdom's new centralized defence organization, which will co-operate with the defence machinery of the Dominions, Mr. Alexander said the Labor government seeks to increase opportunities for exchange of defence information and views with the Dominions. Arrangements for liaison with the dominions are the "crux of the matter" said Mr. Alexander, adding that the war centralization and freedom of action of the dominions must be recognized.
