MONTREAL, Jan. 11.—Doubtless on livestock branch. There were 120 cattle, 183 lambs, 715 hogs and 150 calves, for sale on the two markets this morning. Prices were on a par with yesterday. The best steers were sold last yesterday for \$7.25 and the cattle offered today were common cows and camers. The common cows sold from \$3.50 to \$4.25 with canners \$2.50 fairly good veal calves were sold from \$11.00 to \$11.50 and common ones \$10.00 to \$11.00. There were no top quality veals but buyers were quoting \$12.00 to \$12.50 for real good calves common lambs sold from \$9.25 to \$10.00 and some better ones \$10.25. The bulk of the hogs were sold to the local butcher trade at \$11.75 for mixed lots of good quality.

A statistical bureau is also a necessity. The Association is not in a position to take it in hand under the present state of finances. It was limited in its means of support, which came largely from Charlottetown and Summerside the city and the Provincial Government. The need of a bureau is made apparent every day. P. E. I. is probably the only province in Canada which has not such a public convenience. Justice Arsenault then read the financial report which was as follows:

Following which he gave the following data: In 1925, 800 motor cars were to the province in 1926 there were 2500. In regard to Railway traffic in 1925 during the months of July, August and September, 16,773 persons left the island. In 1926, 15,664 left. In 1925 there were 12,628 who came by Borden and in 1926 there came 16,091. In 1926 almost 4800 came on the Hochelaga from Pictou about 595 autos. The Association distributed about 25,000 pieces of literature during the past year.

Mr. E. T. Higgs suggested that an auto bus service through the different centres of interest or different days would be a good policy.

Mr. T. W. L. Prowse, representing the city made a few remarks concerning the good work done by the Association and expressed the fact that opportunity may arise to increase the \$300 grant of the city. He concluded in saying that he was greatly interested in the work of the Association and would gladly help it at any time.

His Worship Mayor Miller the next speaker, regretted that he was late in arriving. But he expressed them that any movement of the Association had his hearty support. He believed the city would do all it could to forward the interests of the Association financially. He regretted the loss of Mr. Tinnay as secretary, he gave every satisfaction and his courtesy to all his well-known. In concluding he said that anything he could do for the Association would be done.

The meeting of the Summerside Town Council took place Monday night. The Mayor and all the Councilors were present. The following paid accounts were passed: On Town account \$4,524.00 on acct. electric light, \$2,410.10 and the following unpaid accounts were passed for payment: Town \$32.20, electric light \$430.77. A letter from Dr. Cameron V.S. regarding his resignation as Milk and Meat Inspector was read and his resignation was accepted. A communication from the Canadian National Railway authorities advising that the Railway did not own Boston Street and that the amount charged against the property was incorrect was discussed and a rebate of \$78.00 was decided upon. Discussions as to the best way to treat the icy sidewalks also the fire bell operation took place. Correspondence was read re the Water Street project regarding the cost between the Government, the Town and property holders and it was decided that the Mayor go to Charlottetown with statements as to how the matter stands and obtain a final statement of Summerside's share of the Federal Government Grant.
