LONDON, Dec. 27—(AP)—Pope Pius XII, in a Christmas message to the world prayed that this will be the last Christmas of war, and appealed to mankind to begin the planning of a peace of justice and brotherhood.

Awarded George Medal Posthumously

OTTAWA, Dec. 27—(CP)—An R.C.A.F. student navigator who died in the controls and ordered his three companions to bail out, later crashing to his death with the Lancaster bomber bound for Leipzig, was posthumously awarded the George Cross, the R.C.A.F. announced tonight.

The student was LAC Kenneth G. Spooner of Smiths Falls, Ont. He was awarded the medal by WO Norman D. Smith at Harvey Station, N. B.

The aircraft carrying Spooner, the pilot and the three other crew members was on a routine training flight when the pilot faltered, and the bomber, who never before had flown a plane, took over.

The citation covering his award a decoration ranking second only to the Victoria Cross, said in part that he sacrificed his life to save the lives of his comrades "with complete disregard for his personal safety and conformity with the highest tradition of the service."

Expect More Rigid News Censorship

LONDON, Dec. 27—(CP)—More rigid censorship of war news flowing from Britain to the United States can be expected in the coming weeks as British and United States forces mass their strength for the continental invasion under Gen. Dwight Eisenhower.

This was forewarned today by the disclosure by Capt. Eugene N. Lee, who is taking over as the U.S. army's chief press censor, that the military censorship setup is being expanded considerably.

He insisted, however, that the move was only normal under the circumstances. The army censorship staff for the European theatre of operations now numbers 30, almost double in recent weeks, and it is expected to be increased soon.

"We are getting pretty glib," Capt. Nee said, "since coming events may cast their shadows before them."

Still At It

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27—(AP)—Senator Burton Wheeler (Dem. Mont.) asserted today that the United States should not be called upon to furnish more men than Great Britain for the projected invasion of western Europe and said the American Government is taking "a tremendous gamble" if it supplies more than an equal share of the troops required for across channel assault.

Wheeler said in an interview: "Why should we furnish more than an equal share of the men for the invasion? If we are to furnish 70 per cent or more, we will be furnishing far too great a proportion. At least it should be a 50-50 proposition between us and Great Britain."

Wheeler was a leading isolationist before the United States entered the war.

NEW YORK, Dec. 27—(AP)—Radio France at Algiers said today the German pocket battleship Luetow had been damaged in the naval battle in which the Nazi battleship Scourer was sunk.

The report, not confirmed by the British Admiralty or by Berlin, was picked up by the Federal Communications Commission.
