MRS. JOHN BROWN—The death occurred Sunday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. P. J. Oliver, 75 Upper Prince Street, of Christina Campbell widow of the late John Brown. Mrs. Brown had reached the advanced age of eighty-eight years. She was born at Brookfield, but she was a resident of Charlottetown for over seventy years. She had enjoyed comparatively good health up to within three months ago, and last week took a severe stroke of paralysis from which she never rallied.

EXPECTS LARGE TOURIST TRADE—That the summer tourist travel from the New England States to the Maritime Provinces would be unusually heavy, this season, was the opinion expressed by Mr. F. W. Robertson, C. N. R. General Passenger Agent, on his way from Boston to headquarters at Moncton. Mr. Robertson said that the C. N. R. was spending \$5,000 this year in advertising the climatic and scenic advantages of the Maritimes as a summer vacation playground. The fact that there was only one Boston train daily to St. John, he felt, would be a handicap in the handling of the full volume of tourist travel but he understood that there was still a possibility that two trains would be run, the matter of arranging this depending on the working out of a suitable time table. Boston papers this year, he said, would be well filled with advertisements of the summer attractions of Maine and the Maritime Provinces. One reason that an exceptionally large tourist travel is expected is the exodus of people from here which has taken place in the past two years. Years ago when a similar migration to the States took place it was found that for several years after former residents of the provinces took occasion to visit their old homes here. This gradually died off after years of residence in New England. Railway officials believe that the same conditions will be repeated this year. Mr. Robertson said that a great bulk of the tourists coming East went to Prince Edward Island and that there good hotel accommodations was to be found at Charlottetown and Souris. Badcock attracted numbers, but the hotel accommodation there was limited. Better and more hotels in the Maritime Provinces would be a big asset in attracting tourists, he said.

Tablet Unveiled At Victoria

An event worthy of more than passing notice was the unveiling on Sunday afternoon of a large marble tablet bearing the names of all the boys from Victoria district who served overseas in the Great War, and erected to the memory of those who had fallen in battle. The tablet which cost in the vicinity of three hundred dollars is built into the wall of the large new hall recently erected in Victoria. The event was under the auspices of the Women's Institute. A number of speakers were expected from Charlottetown but for some reason they were unable to present, and the Rev. Mr. Somers kindly consented to conduct the service. Speaking from the words of Paul "I am a debtor" he delivered one of the ablest addresses heard in this part of the country for a long time. The Rev. Mr. Somers portrayed the early days of the pioneers of the Province and showed where each succeeding generation is the debtor to the one which had gone before and so down to the present day those who for various reasons were not in a position to serve overseas would forever remain the debtors of those who had answered the call and had risked their lives in the defence of the empire to the end that liberty and righteousness might prevail. The large hall was filled to capacity, excellent music was furnished by the Victoria choir. The Women's Institute of Victoria is to be congratulated not only for the way in which they carried out this event but for all they have done for their village since their organization.
