The annual meeting of the United Brotherhood of Longshoremen was held in their hall Wednesday evening. The auditing committee reported the financial affairs in a financial condition which reflects much credit to the officers in charge. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President--John McKenna (re-elected); Vice-President--Gregory Hughes (re-elected); Secretary--Daniel Coughlin (re-elected); Treasurer--Patrick Keenan (re-elected); Guide--John Gillis (re-elected). Guardian--John Mullins (re-elected). The report for the year is very creditable. The organization's dealings with merchants and steamboat agents in this city have been entirely satisfactory to all parties concerned, and the order has proved itself well worthy of recognition.

Owing to the storm yesterday all outward trains from this city were cancelled. The incoming trains all arrived in this city, some late, with the exception of the express from Summerside due at nine o'clock. A snow clearing train will leave this city at six-thirty this morning and it is expected that the track will be cleared and ready for the resumption of regular traffic by this afternoon or evening at the latest. The new timetable will go into effect tomorrow morning at six o'clock. Due notice of this has already been given in a previous issue. The C. G. S. Minto left Summerside yesterday morning at 11.30 for Cape Tormentine, taking with her a small quantity of mail for the mainland. She made very little progress owing to the storm and later anchored off Carleton Point where she was reported at ten o'clock last night. She will proceed to Charlottetown instead of Cape Tormentine and is expected in this port early this morning. She will proceed to Pictou after her arrival in this port, and will take passengers and mails returning on Saturday. The Earl Grey left this city yesterday morning at seven thirty taking mails and passengers and anchored off Wood Island's where she remained all day. After the storm cleared she was to have proceeded to Pictou and will return this evening, bringing mails, all of which have been ordered to Pictou. There is no mail matter at either Et du Chene or Cape Tormentine. The Minto and the Earl Grey will keep up the communication from this date running on alternate days and as long as possible, will continue to use Charlottetown and Pictou as terminal ports. The article in yesterday's issue regarding the movements of the trains and steamers was misleading inasmuch as it stated that the Minto would leave Summerside "tomorrow," meaning the morning of the thirtieth. Also in mentioning the handling of the previous day's mails the changes were not made as clear as possible.
