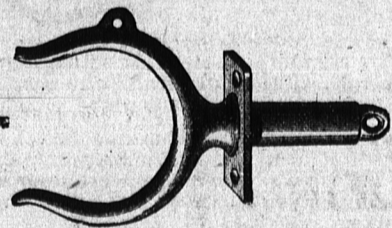

THE WINTER STEAMERS.—The winter steamers have made a splendid record this winter, the first time in the history of winter navigation have practically kept up "continuity of communication with the mainland." Much had been expected of the new and powerful Car ferry and she more than fulfilled expectations while the veteran Stanley did even more than could reasonably have been expected from her. Comparisons have been made as to the relative merits of these boats but comparisons in such cases are difficult. The fact is that each has this winter given a service of which their commanders have good reason to feel proud and with which reasonable public should be well satisfied. In the curt reports given in the press regarding the movements of the steamers it is not always possible to be explicit. For example, it was deemed advisable not to found necessary on two occasions to transfer the mails and passengers from the Stanley to the Car Ferry. One of these occasions was on the 9th inst. when the Stanley was incorrectly reported "fast in the ice." This was not correct. The Stanley's captain that morning went ten miles out of her way so as to put his mails and passengers on board the Car Ferry as he did not feel justified in keeping on his course to George town with the possibility, as it then appeared, of being caught in the ice off Cape Bear and so delaying the mails and passengers. It was the precaution of an officer who was more anxious to serve the public than to make a record for his ship. Neither steamer has been detained but very little during the winter and the service has been by incomparable odds the best the province has ever experienced.

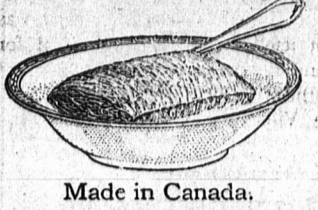

KILLING WEEDS.

Weeds should be killed just as the seeds are germinating, or while they are yet very little. When this is done but very little moisture is lost through them, and they render but little plant food insoluble. In the thorough and early preparation of the seed bed weeds are destroyed by killing them with a hoe or while coming up. It is the same in the case of a grain field, which is rolled after being seeded, and is then harrowed; the rolling hastens the germination of the weed seeds, and the harrowing then throws them out into a dry soil, which kills them. If such a field is again harrowed just after the grain is up, a second crop of weeds may be destroyed and the yield made greater as a consequence. In the case of potatoes and corn it is an easy thing to destroy at least two crops of weeds before the corn or potatoes are large enough to cultivate by harrowing before and just after the plants are up. This is very important, because it not only saves plant food for the crop, but it can be done so much more cheaply and rapidly with the broad light harrows and weeders than it can later with the cultivator.

that prices were not greater than those paid in the United States. A large concern in the United States had deemed to embark in the business of making munitions because it involved the introduction of new machinery, was precarious and would not be permanent, Canadian firms, however, had provided themselves with plants and were soon furnishing shells to the British Government.

Postmortem Which Would Serve No Useful Purpose. Mr. Bennett was of the opinion that larger shell orders would be placed in the Dominion if the problem of paying for them in Canada was solved.

Mr. Bennett went on to point out that Sir Alexander-Bertram and Mr. David Carnegie, although members of the shell committee was dead, members of the opposition proposed to hold a postmortem which would serve no useful purpose—because the British authorities were satisfied—to enable them "malign their opponents and vilify the people of the country in which they live." The member for Carleton said that an enquiry would give no pleasure to the people of Canada but it would give pleasure to the people of the Central Powers. Mr. Carvell has given information regarding prices of contracts, which should never have been made public. He had been guilty of substituting patriotism for patriotism.

The member for Calgary said that money expended by the imperial government should be accounted for to the imperial parliament and the British people. If the Canadian parliament investigated the expenditures of the imperial government in Canada it should also investigate such expenditures in Australia and the United States. So far not a dollar had been charged to Canada for shells bought here. When Canada was charged with expenditure for munitions of war, Mr. Bennett was prepared to assist in an enquiry and to see that Canada's money was properly expended. The house adjourned shortly before midnight.
