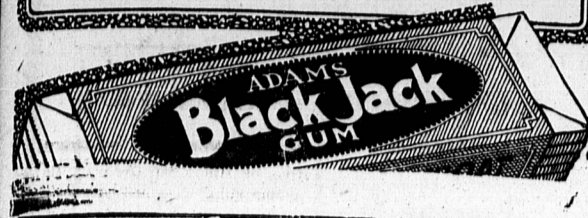


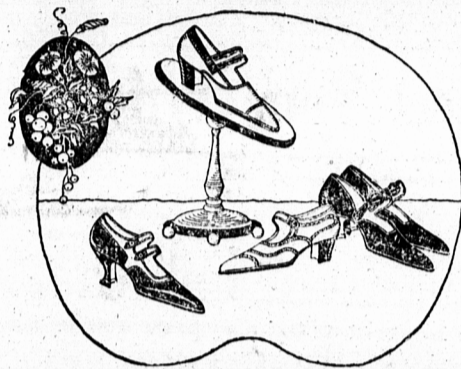

COUNTRY PRODUCE TRADE Eggs Firmer—New Crop Potatoes Slightly Easier.

Receipts of eggs at Montreal yesterday were 1,741 cases as compared with 1,803 cases on Friday of last week, and 2,239 cases on the corresponding day in 1920. The local market for eggs remained practically unchanged with the undertone becoming increasingly firm.

The stiffer country prices of early in the week were maintained and local prices have moved up to meet this condition. There is some export enquiry and an active business is going on for domestic.

Wholesale jobbing prices were quoted yesterday as follows: Specials 46c to 48c Extras 44c to 46c No. 1's 38c to 40c No. 2's 30c to 32c

New crop potatoes still rule at \$3 to \$3.25 per bag of eight pounds. Offerings were slightly heavier yesterday and the market showed an easier tendency.

There is no improvement in the local market for maple products, little business being reported. Prices remain nominally unchanged with maple syrup quoted at \$1.45 to \$1.75 per tin of one gallon capacity and maple sugar at 15 cents to 17 cents per pound according to quality.

New York, August 12.—Eggs irregular. Receipts, 21,238 cases; Fresh gathered, extra firsts, 38c to 41c; fresh gathered, firsts, 34c to 37c; State, Pennsylvania and nearby western, hennery whites, firsts to extras, 47c to 58c; do, browns, extras, 46c to 48c; do, gathered, browns and mixed colors, firsts to extras, 35c to 45c; refrigerator firsts, 35c to 38 1/2c.

OFFICIAL ESTIMATE OF CANADA'S GRAIN CROP

OTTAWA, Aug. 14.—Canada's wheat crop this year is estimated at 238,493,000 bushels, based on conditions of July 31, against 263,189,300 bushels last year. In the Dominion Bureau of Statistics report on field crops for Canada. Other estimates are: Oats, 457,514,000 bushels, as against last year's record yield of 530,027,000 bushels, as against 63,310,550 bushels; rye, 11,707,100 bushels, as against 11,306,400 bushels; flax seed, 6,000,000 bushels, as against 7,997,000 bushels, as against last year's bumper crop of 133,831,400 bushels.

Premier Arthur Meighen At Eondon

Dominion navies, constituted his position on the naval question. And whatever may be dictated by future events, and while the whole question of naval defence must soon or later be considered in the light of coming developments, it was a position to which no Canadian party or school of thought can take reasonable exception.

Relations between Dominions

On the subject of Imperial status, Mr. Meighen took a leading part. His speech on the relations which ought to exist between the Dominions of the one hand and the British Government on the other summarized into four propositions by the press—formed the basis upon which all subsequent discussion rested. It was a declaration of policy which, although it anticipated no new departure, definitely re-affirmed the altered conditions brought about by the war, and maintained and upheld the best constitutional aspirations of Canadian statesmen in the past.

On other questions, comparatively minor, but still of moment, Mr. Meighen's voice was listened to with ever-increasing respect. With General Smuts, as usual, the dominant personalities of the Conference, and while he did not always see eye to eye with Lloyd George and while their differences were sometimes expressed with a vigor and a candor that are at once the pride and the safeguard of British institutions, the two became fast friends. As for the British press, it was unreservedly in its admiration for the young Canadian Premier. Thus the London Times and the Daily Telegraph vied with such Liberal organs as the Manchester Guardian and the Daily News and such Radical Reviews as the Nation and the New Statesman in eulogizing his abilities and gifts.

Premier Appeals to British

Reserved, reticent almost to the point of being secretive, ascetic in appearance and logical and incisive in his pronouncements, he appealed to the British public. The old fashioned oratory no longer holds sway in Britain, and Mr. Meighen's capacity for cold, dispassionate analysis, his passion for facts and realities as opposed to rhetoric and high-sounding generalities, left an excellent impression. His speeches were few, but those he delivered were on a high plane. The best, perhaps, was that which he made at the unveiling of a Cross of Sacrifice over the fallen Canadians at Vimy. Beautiful in its solemnity and simplicity, chaste in structure, there was about it a touch of the spiritual which animated Lincoln's majestic utterances at Gettysburg, and the London Times, not lightly influenced by the eloquence of statesmen, was moved to eulogize it as a "fine example of chaste and delicate diction." Hardly less excellent was his address at Gray's Inn, where, speaking to the leading jurists of the British Isles, he delivered a penetrating and eloquent analysis of the principles underlying the British constitution; or his speech at Edinburgh, where, with more passion than is has won him the part that Scotsmen have played in the development of the Dominion.

Avoids Social Functions

But Mr. Meighen gave little time to speech making. Words of counsel he reserved for the council table, and social pleasures and festivities, so much a part of bygone Imperial Conferences, he sternly avoided. His task, he believed was to help despatch the business for the Conference as speedily as adequate consideration permitted and to return to his own country to grapple with domestic problems. 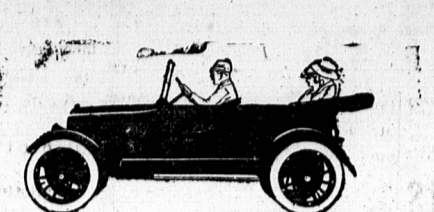

BE SMART, SWEET MAID, LET WHO WILL BE CLEVER

"Be smart, sweet maid, and let who will be clever," was a dictum that came from Paris some time ago, and blessed is she who can accomplish this. For that will mean originality, which is beloved of every woman, possessed by a few and envied by many. Variety is the spice of life, and what is variety but originality? Many forms of this wonderful quality are not attractive, particularly some aspects of the fashion world, but after all there is something to be said for them, when they relieve the monotony of every day life. Things that are not copied or imitated from others, in any branch of life, have more charm and far more attraction for every one, than through such use. The genuine, the new, the fresh endeavor brings forth much more approbation and gives greater pleasure.

Though the above quotation was used in connection with the latest fashion, yet that same piquant saying might be applied to any walk of life, social or commercial or artistic. Of course, anything else for that matter, may become common from much use, but on the other, it has a decidedly stimulating effect on the minds of women in general. Every new fad may not be acceptable, but at least it has one good quality, it does not allow of stagnation. The centre of fashion has been for many years that delightful city, Paris, but it can not claim all of that most desirable characteristic. To the discerning eye there is much to be found of fresh ways of making up lovely material even in the west, but the custom so long established of accepting Parisian decrees has become so ingrained that it is now taken without any further thought, simply because it comes from the French capital.

In this connection it is rather interesting to note the dress-making course at the high schools of the present day. Though certain definite methods must be followed to obtain correct results, the colors and designs are nearly always left to the girl herself to choose, and therein lies her chance to show what she is made of, and whether she has the divine spark of originality. Her choice of tints and the style she decided to make use of to fashion her gown of, will very likely indicate whether she has any trace of that sense that will not allow of imitation.

Again, the subjects of painting and drawing taken up in the schools, give scope for originality, since the student is allowed to use color as she wishes, and any originality in such talent often leads to fame follows. A new combination of shades will often lend a fresh shape to a drawing and thus a different design is apparently evolved. An original style in writing will

mean fame to the writer and thus it pays to develop one's own style, and the wood anemones are still in the lower grades of our present grasses. Thus spring and summer form of education, yet in the university such a talent is sought and every kind display their earliest not repressed. There should be no such thing as imitation there and pink; and overhead there is the only originality of thought and conception should hold sway. The powers that be in the present system of education are slow in recognizing the usefulness and necessity of allowing the children to use their own brains more and more, and then there is a wider latitude give them. A picture is often put up on the blackboard and the children are asked what they see there, and it becomes a matter of keen competition to be the first to tell what is there shown. Thus the faculty of observation becomes highly developed and then, of course, it is but a step to the expansion of the sense of originality.
