POLITICAL RECORD OF QUEENS.

Queens County was a separate electoral district returning two members from the date of the union in 1873 down to the election of 1891. In the year 1892 the county was divided for electoral purposes into East Queens and West Queens, with certain additions from adjoining counties. This arrangement continued down to the recent redistribution when the original status of the county as a single electoral district returning two members was restored. The record of the county as between the two great parties at general elections has been as below:

Hon. Mr. Brecken having been appointed Postmaster, a bye-election was held in 1884 which resulted in the election of Dr. Jenkins, Conservative, by a majority of 40.

EAST QUEENS.

In the election of 1900 Mr. Martin was first declared elected by a majority of 10 votes, but on a recount Mr. McKinnon was declared to have a majority of 7. On petition the election was held to be void. A new election held in March 1901 gave Mr. McKinnon a majority of 394.

WEST QUEENS.

The appointment of Sir Louis H. Davies to the Supreme Court of Canada brought on a by-election in which Hon. D. Farquharson was elected, January 15, 1902 by a majority of 493. Mr. Farquharson's death was followed by another by-election, February 16, 1904 at which Mr. Haszard was elected with a majority of 311.

Yesterday morning The Guardian told its readers that at the Conservative meeting in the large new Market Hall "almost every seat was filled". The Examiner last evening told that "the new Market Hall was completely filled". The Patriot has the following as to the attendance: "Notwithstanding that the Conservatives had special rates and special trains from all parts of the Island, the number of persons who came from the centres and country to attend the political meeting last night was incredibly small—so small in fact that those who hired the special trains will lose a large part of their deposit." These who did not attend the meeting and have to depend upon the newspapers for a statement of the attendance can take their choice of the three accounts.

A very plain-spoken Methodist minister, taking the courage of his convictions, writes over his own signature that complaints reach him of the profanity of one candidate and the ineptitude of another. He wants to know the reason why the party conventions cannot make better selections, and comments with some severity upon the degradation of politics. We withhold the letter and the writer's name, as he speaks only from hearsay. But in this Christian land we are surely entitled to be represented by men who are clean, sober, honest and self-respecting. This should be insisted upon by a right-thinking electors. This is a sober Province in which also profanity is held in disrepute. We can only send four men to the House of Commons and should insist upon both character and ability in those who are to represent us in that body.

It is not yet too late to recall that the success and satisfaction attending the late Exhibition, which are yet spoken of were largely due to the President and Secretary of the Association under whose direction it was held. President F. L. Haszard is a capable and always courteous official, and Secretary Smallwood has so systematised his work and become so familiar with it that all ran very smoothly from start to finish. Complaints were very few indeed and the warm words of praise from men like F. W. Hodson and others, commending the management as equal to any and superior to most Exhibitions, were well deserved.

Celestial Refreshments.

Places of rest and refreshment are commonly to be found at the halting stations on the highways in the interior, or at the villages on the banks of the great rivers of China. They frequently take the form of a small mud hut, having a dark interior filled with smoke, tea tables, forms, and an oven, where a cook is kept busy baking tea bread and frying puddings for the entertainment of the customers, whose favorite beverage is tea, although when times are good and the weather cold they indulge in something stronger, which often inebriates, and that at a very cheap rate. In the darkest corner there are a row of glazed earthenware jars, containing a kind of Chinese whiskey, of which a thirsty carter may have a skiff for something considerably under a penny; when he will go quietly to sleep on the shaft of his cart, and his pony or mule, being used to it, will take him home.

In addition to these conveniences there is an ingenious little furnace in front, having a long flue, through which the flame is driven by an air pump, and a row of hot water kettles, gradually increasing in size to suit the heat of the tongue of flame that passes up the flue beneath, so that they may be all kept boiling. The hot water is sold passers-by, who usually carry with them their teapot and tea, so that they may have a cup at every station. This custom of carrying one's own tea is so common that it is difficult to procure a cup of tea in any of the restaurants, as they do not keep it, and do not care to go out of their way to buy it for you. Although the plant may be growing all round, and at one's very feet, it is next to impossible to get a cup that a foreigner would consider worth drinking; and as to using milk and sugar the Chinese look upon the practice as a barbarous device of the "foreign devil."
