INTO THE MELTING POT OF NEW YORK IN "HEART OF A NATION"

"Heart of a Nation," one of the greatest motion pictures of the year, opened at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday.

It is an unusual picture in many ways. In the first place it brings George Sydney in a dramatic role. Sydney is too great an actor to stay always in the comedies which have brought him so much fame.

He portrays his role in "Heart of a Nation" with rare discrimination; he never overacts, and proves himself capable of rare emotional depth including honest tears.

York, from Russia, Germany and Italy. The parents retain all they love of the old country, making no effort to become Americanized, while the children grow up to be typical young Americans, incapable of understanding their parents, who, in turn, are incapable of understanding their children.

But the War comes along for a brief moment and their children enlist. To go further would spoil your enjoyment of this masterpiece but you can see the possibilities. The ending is of rare beauty and happiness, raising the picture to the heights of art.

Toronto Has Good Chance in International

Eva Morrison Wins Swim Race Against Time

Another former Maritime athlete, Miss Eva Morrison, from Pictou, N. S., still continues her swimming triumphs in and about Boston. The Bluenose nataria won a swim against time to the Boston Light on Sunday, being in the water eight hours. Her trainer, Michael Connolly, had her use the trudgeon stroke. Miss Morrison has used the breaststroke in previous swims to the Light.

Her Sunday performance found her making good headway from the starting point, Warren Street Bridge at noon, until she reached Fort Warren at 6 o'clock. Here she was caught in the tide and went out the Black Rock Channel. She managed to reach the Bug Light, and it took nearly two hours to traverse the final mile and a half.

The swim to the Light has proved very arduous to the long-distance mermen and maids this season, the feat being accomplished in very few instances. Miss Morrison has been successful several times in negotiating this course.

Grogan Kayoes Newark Negro In Ninth Round

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Tommy Grogan, sensational Omaha lightweight, won on a technical knockout in the ninth round of his ten-round bout with Al Bryant, Newark, N. J. negro, at the Queensboro Stadium tonight. Grogan sent Bryant down three times for counts of nine in the third round but the negro was game and came back strong. He was taking severe punishment in the ninth when the referee stopped the fight. The weights were: Grogan, 135 1-4; Bryant, 137.

Jack McVey, New York negro middleweight, won the decision over Johnny Haystack, of Binghamton, N. Y., in the ten-round semi-final. McVey weighing 160 1-2 and Haystack 155 1-4.

NEMIS TAKES BAD BEATING

Courageous Italian Boxer Takes Six Nine Counts and is Saved By the Bell In the Fifth and Sixth Greatest Exhibition of Gameness Ever Seen In a Cape Breton Ring — Nemis No Match For Jack McKenna, Canadian Champion.

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 19.—Eighteen hundred fight fans looked upon an exhibition of gameness and courage under fire such as has never been equalled or surpassed in Cape Breton ring annals, when Johnny Nemis, of New Waterford, was given an unmerciful lacing here tonight by Jack McKenna of Cleveland, Ohio, formerly of this city. Nemis, knocked down five times, thrice in the fifth round and saved by the bell in the fifth and sixth staggered helplessly through the remaining rounds in a bad way, but managed to keep on his feet until the finish of the battle, although in the tenth he was on the verge of a knock-out.

Nemis' first knock down came in the first round, but he did not take a count, and for the next three rounds kept with McKenna, although he absorbed plenty of punishment, at the same time he made McKenna miss frequently.

What many thought would be the finish of the fight came in the fifth round, when taking a succession of terrific blows to the chin, Nemis went down for the count of nine. When he got up, he was sent down again for another count of the same duration, and earned the plaudits of the crowd when he again arose, only to meet another crushing attack which sent him to the canvas for a

third time, knocked out. The bell sounded as the referee began his count. He managed to weather the sixth until near the end of the round when he was knocked down and again the bell saved him. The seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth rounds, were repetitions of these two sessions, with Nemis offering little or no resistance to McKenna's tiger-like attacks.

In the semi-final Louis Nemis, of New Waterford, knocked out "Battling" Skinner of Glace Bay in two rounds.

Tommy Casey of Glace Bay refereed the bout which was attended by a crowd second only in numbers to the McKenna-Fifield fight here two years ago, which attracted 1,900 fans.
