70 MILES TREATED

Approximately 70 miles of Island highways have been treated with calcium chloride this season, 1,800 bags or seven carloads of the salt have been used and no further supplies will be available until late in August. Due to the fact that the chemical holds out water it is not considered advisable to treat high ways late in the season. The average cost of treating a mile of highway is approximately \$200 with the material costing about \$40 per ton bulk.

NEW THERAPY TREATMENT

Occupational therapy will be available to both male and female psychiatric patients at Falconwood Hospital when an R.C.A.F. building is completed within the next few weeks, it was announced yesterday, Miss H.I. Hand looms, harness tables and sewing machines will be used in this curative work by groups of thirty men and women in the two divisions of the building. U.S. NAVAL SHIPS VISITING CHARLOTTETOWN
