KILLED IN ACTION

Official word has come of the death in action of Sgt. John C. MacEwen, son of W. H. and Barbara (MacNeil) MacEwen of New Dominion. John Charles MacEwen was born in August 1894, and at the time of his death Sept. 28 was just 24 years and one month.

At the outbreak of the war he enlisted willingly and cheerfully. He did garrison duty at Halifax for 10 months then joined the 55th Overseas Battery, was some time at Valcartier and sailed from Quebec Oct. 1915. After again training in England he went to France April 1916 having given up his stripes as Sgt. and reverting to Pte. but he regained them on the field.

In June 1915 he came through the fierce battle of Hooge and later in Sep. was wounded on the Somme.

He was sent to England and went the rounds of the different hospitals for four months and was again marked fit and crossed to France Jan. 1916 from which time he was in continuous service with the exception of a two weeks' furlough to England Christmas 1917—and a month laid up with a sore ear in the south of France.

He fought in the battles of Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele, the big drive in March and the taking of Cambrai where he met his death, Sept. 28th.

On Sept. 25 he wrote his last letter home said he was in the best of health and was very cheerful. The news seemed particularly

He ranges Himself by their side in every holy cause and will not slack this hand until He carries that cause and those who battle for it up the steps to the very threshold of Heaven.

The sorrowing parents and four brothers—David who was 20 months in France and wounded in Aug. but now convalescing in England—George Gordon, Walter and one sister Elizabeth are left to mourn.

France, Oct. 31st, 1918.
Dear Mr. MacEwen.—Please forgive me for not writing to you before, but really things have been undoing very fast the past month and we have had little time for writing.

Your son's death was the greatest blow I have ever received. He had been in charge of the Scout Section since last November and it was due to his hard work and never failing courage, that the section attained the high standard it held before the recent operations. He was one of the most cheerful men, under all circumstances, I have met in France.

The deed by which he met his death shows his utter disregard for personal danger. He led a platoon against an enemy counter-attack and succeeded in re-occupying the trench which was the key to the situation.

I know how you feel and how much you will miss your son but you have the consolation of knowing he died for the Empire performing a deed, which will never be forgotten in this regiment. Please accept my sincerest sympathy and if there is anything I can ever do for you—please let me know.

France, Oct. 13th, 1918
Dear Mrs. MacEwen,—Probably by this time you have been informed of the sad news of your son's (Sergt. MacEwen) death, but as I was with him at the time and had known him for two years, in fact so long, he was almost the same as a brother to me, I am

writing these few lines to let you know how much we thought of John (or Mac) as we called him here.

Even though you mourn the loss of a true friend and brave comrade. It was during an enemy counter attack that Sergt. MacEwen and I took reinforcements to the front line, and drove the enemy out, and when all was quiet, we were sent to Headquarters when Sergt. MacEwen was shot by a sniper. I was about six feet from him and dropped by his side to see where he was hit, but it was too late as he died instantly.

We buried him as best we could and our Padre held a service at his grave. I am enclosing some photos found in his pocket and trust you get them O. K.

Sympathizing with you great loss.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Fee by way of fee for a homesteaded land is \$10.00 but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.
