"Now gentlemen, don't be in a day of a year. The oyster business is not going to be conducted on the loose," was the advice of an eminent surgeon to his assistants while the patient, waiting for the knife, lay on the operating table.
In our province today we are facing, not a patient on an operating table, but an industry the development of which will be either greatly delayed or greatly hastened by the treatment about to be given to it. We refer to the oyster industry, the biggest thing in sight for the province at present, not excepting the fox business.

Past experience teaches us that the oyster beds of our province are immensely rich and experts tell us the conditions for culture and development are equal to the best in the world. Mr. Johnson of Greenport, L. I., to whose visit reference has already been made in The Guardian, and whose knowledge of the oyster business has been gathered on some of the world's largest and most successful oyster farms, informed us, while here, that he knows of no place in which conditions are more favorable. He was greatly impressed with the possibilities and amazed that development had been so long delayed. His opinion, intelligently and freely expressed, was that Richmond Bay, the only one of our oyster beds of which he had learned anything, is a veritable gold mine with unlimited wealth for those who seek it, provided they seek it wisely and intelligently.
Quite a number of companies have been organized to develop the oyster business; quite a large capital has already been invested for this development and we understand preparation on an extensive scale is in progress to begin operations in the spring. This is commendable. It should have been done years ago. But it is not going to be done in a

THE NAVAL POLICY
The naval policy passed its second reading at an early hour Friday morning, the Borden measure being carried by a majority of thirty. So far the vote has been practically a party one, Liberals declaring their allegiance to the Empire by voting solidly, with one exception—Col. McLean of New Brunswick, for the policy of their leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier; the Conservatives similarly evincing their unalterable devotion to the same Empire by standing solidly with their leader, the Right Honorable R. L. Borden. Four Liberals and seven Conservative Nationalists

The speeches of the two leaders are pronounced "brilliant" by the press of both parties, the others, with few exceptions, being declared "tiresome" by those whose chief anxiety appears to have been to see the thing settled.
Sir Wilfrid based his remarks on the "double consideration, the rights of Canada as a nation, the duties of Canada as part of the British Empire." He maintained the right of Canadians to control their own affairs as a nation within the Empire, to guard their own coasts and trade routes and to assume that portion of the imperial burden which Britain is now carrying. He ridiculed the idea of a German peril.
Premier Borden stood for "one empire, one fleet, and one foreign policy, as compared with five foreign policies and five scattered fleets of five scattered portions of the Empire which must then all go down, inevitably to defeat."
Loyalty to the Empire, although, on both sides of the House, forming a constant feature in the discussion, does not bulk sufficiently large in the question at issue to constitute the difference between the two policies. There is no question of loyalty involved. The loyalty of Canadians has never been questioned, except for political purposes. Did danger threaten either Canada or the Empire, which is one and undivided, there would be no more question as to party affiliations, no more hesitation in rushing to the rescue than when, "on Queenston's Heights and Lundy's Lane, our brave fathers, side by side, for freedom, home and loved ones, dear firmly fought and nobly died." Canadians, without exception, acknowledge their obligation to assume their rightful share of the imperial burden. The only question at issue is how that burden may be best assumed and regrettably the country has become divided upon it. There are two distinct policies, each based on unalterable allegiance to the Empire, but each the sine qua non of

a political party.
Canada will, with the policy that she adopts, do her full duty by the Empire, and both Canada and the Empire will continue to grow in power and stability, but in the years to come, the first real gift would bulk much larger had the whole family been united as to the nature and size of the gift from one who is "daughter in her mother's house and mistress in her own."

MAY PREVENT EXPORT OF GAS FROM ONE PROVINCE TO ANOTHER.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27—The question of the conservation of Alberta's large natural gas resources against the exploitation of various companies recently formed with a view to piping it out of the Province to supply various towns and cities in Saskatchewan and Manitoba, is involved in a question put to the Government in the Commons by W. A. Buchanan of Medicine Hat.
The Minister of Inland Revenue informed Mr. Buchanan that "under the provisions of the electricity and fluid exportation act the Governor in Council has power to regulate or prohibit the exportation of natural gas." Whether the Dominion will permit natural gas to be piped out of the Province, however, is another matter. It is known that powerful friends of the party are interested in companies which have that purpose in view.

DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT BACK IN OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27—Their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, and Princess Patricia, arrived home from Montreal this afternoon, after an absence of some weeks, owing to the illness of the Duchess. The journey from Montreal was made in a special train over the Canadian Pacific Railway. Premier Borden, Hon. Martin Burrell, and other representatives were present to welcome the Royal party home.

FINDS MOTHER AFTER 41 YEARS

WEBSTER, Mass., Feb. 27—Ordered from his home forever by his father, 41 years ago, Hugo Salus, arrived in Webster after a career that has included several years in the navy, discovered by accident that his mother was still alive and living here, and so overjoyed her by seeking a reconciliation that she has suffered a nervous collapse and he has now to watch at her bedside.

The mother, Mrs. Margaret Salus, is now 78, and for some time has been physically weakened by her sorrow at the separation from her son, and her ignorance of his whereabouts and welfare. The son's itinerary as a commercial traveller has therefore been interrupted until she recovers.

In 1872 when the Salus family lived in Troy, N. Y., a dispute arose between father and son which resulted in the latter's disinheriting the father. The boy left and enlisted in the navy and never attempted to communicate with his family.
Soon after the falling out the father died, and Mrs. Salus moved to New York to live with another of her children. From the first she never ceased grieving for her 13-year-old son, Hugo, of whom she heard no word, nor even knew if he was alive. Still later, broken in health, Mrs. Salus moved to Webster.
Today the son registered at a local hotel, and following a custom of late years, inquired if any family named Salus lived in Webster. When his query was answered affirmatively, he sought out his mother's home on North Main Street.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27—At the annual meeting of the cavalry association Wednesday afternoon, Hon. Sam Hughes made the announcement that shortly militia regulations will be issued which will allow men of the lowest grade in the Canadian militia to try qualifying examinations for higher ranks. "The door will be thrown wide open in Canada," stated the Minister, "and not only privates qualify for lieutenants and captains, but they may go as high as brigadiers. The change will extend to all branches of the service."
