IN MEMORIAM.

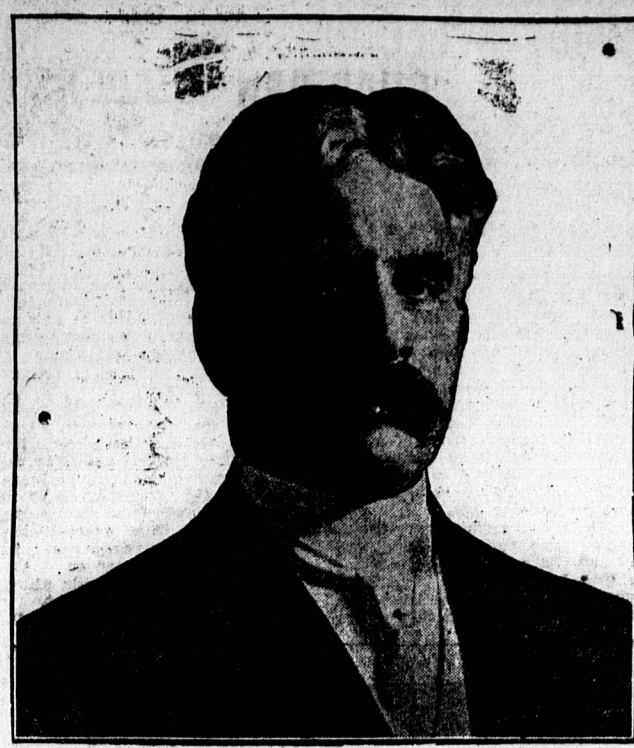

VATICAN ANNEXES OLD ITALIAN MINT. ROME, May 3.—The Pope's dominions have been increased by the addition of the mint, which adjoins the Vatican gardens and which has been used by the Italian government since 1870. It is no longer needed by the governments, as a new one has been built. The Vatican bought the property and will adapt it into barracks for the papal gendarmes.
