who followed, was greeted with loud cheers, and applause. He stated that in driving to Clifton through the storm he could not help but remark how hard it must be for the boys at the front, who are facing weather much worse, most of the time and under far more dangerous and unfavorable conditions.

He told of when the Federal Government had decided to grant \$1,000,000 for the extension of Agricultural interests, the province had been portioned off a share amounting to \$100,000, but on strong representation by himself and Mr. MacLean, this had been increased to \$200,000, and lately to \$300,000.

Speaking of the work of the Car Ferry he stated that it is now taking over 26 loaded L.C.R. cars to Port Borden and freight is moving the other way as well.

The Car Ferry is due to the Borden Government; the additional \$100,000 subsidy is due to the efforts of the Borden Government, so too are the new wharves, the repaired wharves and bridges and the dredging which are now benefiting this province.

He told of the work of the Department of Militia at the outbreak of war, and told how Sir Robert Borden had acted promptly and determinedly in putting down any profiteering, mentioning the Garland bandage case as one instance.

Important Statement From Sir Robert Borden About the Men Who WILL NOT Be Sent Overseas.

The Government Itself Will Appeal to the Central Judge From Any Improper or Unreasonable Decision of a Tribunal Drafting Men Who SHOULD BE Kept Home; NO Married Men Will Be Called for; Nor is There Any Likelihood of the "B" "C," "D," or "E," Men Being Drafted; And No "Class A" Man Who is Essential at Home Will Be Sent Overseas!

Sir Robert Borden has issued an important statement setting forth the attitude of the government with respect to report inconsistent decisions of exemption tribunals appointed under the Military Service Act.

The prime minister points out that in some instances the tribunals, which were NOT appointed by the government, have refused exemption where the circumstances distinctly required that it should be granted.

The tribunals are about 1,350 in number. It is intended that almost 500 many men selected for the discharge of judicial duties there should be some who would not fully appreciate the responsibilities imposed upon them by their positions, and who might unintentionally disregard, to a greater or less degree, the manifest intention of the Military Service Act, and of the instruction thereunder issued to them by the Military Service Council.

(7) The purpose of the Military Service Act is to provide the needed reinforcements by means of a Selective Draft; and it was the intention of parliament that those who could serve their country more usefully and effectively by continuing in essential work in which they were engaged should continue therein, and should be exempt from military service.

(8) From reports received by the prime minister it would appear that in some instances tribunals have refused exemption where the circumstances distinctly required that it should be granted; as, for example, in cases where exemption has been refused to men long engaged in agricultural production, without whose labor such production could not be continued.

(9) It is the intention of the government to enforce appeals on its own behalf to the Central appeal Judge, and to assist in the lodging of such appeals by any persons who have just ground of complaint, so that there may be uniformity of decision in the application of the act throughout Canada.

(10) The attention of those who are included with Class 1 is directed to the importance of the category within which they have been classed upon their medical examination. It is only men who have been included within category "A" who can be called out for active service in the trenches. The need at present is for infantry to serve at the front. As men included within categories "B," "C," "D," and "E" are not considered suitable for this service, there is no likelihood of their being drafted. The best service which they can give the state is in Canada rather than at the front.

Mr. Nicholson said he had it on good authority that the German-Canadian men were very hostile, the women as well as the men.

Regarding the Disfranchisement Act, he said the Donkhorsts, still have a vote and the Meanonites who are a peaceful people do not want to vote as they are not in favor of the war.

He said that Sir Robert Borden had approached Sir Wilfrid Laurier with the proposal that the war cabinet be made up of one-half Liberals and one-half Conservatives until the war would be over.

Laurier laid his ear to the ground, waited three weeks and in that time heard of strong influences that were working against anything intended to win the war. So he said "NO I CAN DO IT."

All the best Liberals, McBurn, Calder, Crerar, Sifton, Rowell, Carvell, Ballantyne and Guthrie could not work rightly with Laurier who was handicapped by the Province of Quebec and so they threw in their lot with Borden to form a Union Government.

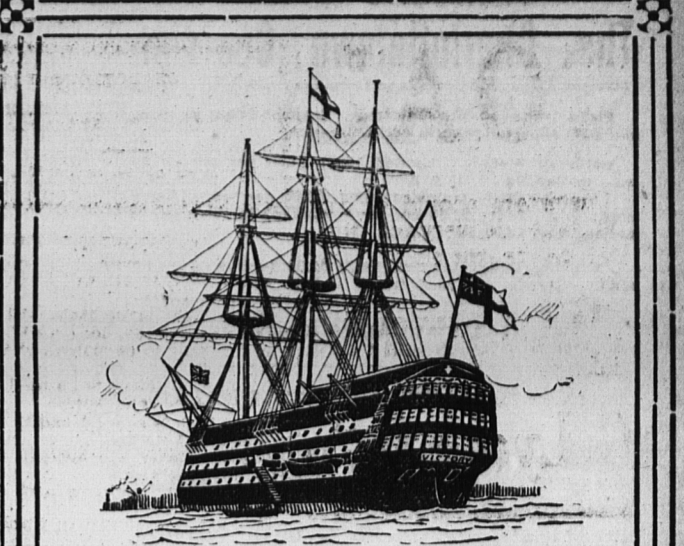
