Women's Driving Titles Decided At Toronto

BESIDES WOMEN'S MEET AUGUST ALSO BRINGS OUTDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS AT BARRIE AND \$50,000 MARATHON AT TORONTO

(Canadian Press.) TORONTO, Ont., August 1.—AUGUST promises to be a big month in Canadian swimming circles. On the first of the month at Barrie, two Canadian swimming championship events will be held, the 50 yards, free style for women, and 100 yard backstroke for men.

The Canadian variety springboard diving championships for women are on the agenda for August 6 at Toronto, and it is expected that divers from all parts of the Dominion will compete. The results will have considerable bearing on the selection of the team to represent Canada in the Olympics next year.

Each competitor will be required to make 10 dives, five of these being compulsory, and the remaining five being selected by the contestants. The compulsory dives are as follows: 1—Plain running dive; 2—Running forward somersault; 3—From a 10-foot springboard; 3-1/2 running somersault; 4—Backward spring and forward dive; 5—Running Molberg.

CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

In the Prairie Provinces conditions continue satisfactory and all crops are making good progress. Some further scattered hail losses have occurred in Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Rust has appeared but whether or not this will develop into serious proportions depends entirely upon the weather in Quebec the crops are progressing favorably but having been delayed by rain in Ontario heavy rainfalls over the whole province have caused slight damage to hay cut but have improved grain and root crops. In the Maritime Provinces all crops have benefited from warm dry weather during the past few days. In British Columbia hot weather has accelerated the growth and all crops are in good condition.

PRAIRIE PROVINCES

In ALBERTA conditions during the past week have been ideal and all crops are progressing rapidly. ALBERTA WESTERN AREA.—Wheat is practically all headed and prospects generally are satisfactory. ALBERTA NORTHEASTERN AREA.—Wheat is headed, in bloom and is filling. At some points prospects are excellent. ALBERTA SOUTHEASTERN AREA.—Favourable progress continues. SASKATCHEWAN NORTHERN AREA.—Grains continue to make good progress. Practically all of the wheat is headed out. There are indications of rust at some points. SASKATCHEWAN SOUTHERN AREA.—With warm weather and ample moisture rapid growth continues and most of the wheat is headed out. Rust is reported from a few points although no damage from this source is apparent. In grain damage which is heaviest in southwest, will reduce yield. MANITOBA.—All grains have made satisfactory progress during the past week. About 75 per cent of wheat is headed out. The hay crop is good.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Haymaking is general and while the crop is good slight damage has been caused in some localities by rain. Oats are promising except in low lying districts where indications point to a light crop. Other crops are progressing favourably. Potatoes and root crops continue to show satisfactory growth. Tobacco is doing well. Small fruits are plentiful. Grass pasturage continues excellent.

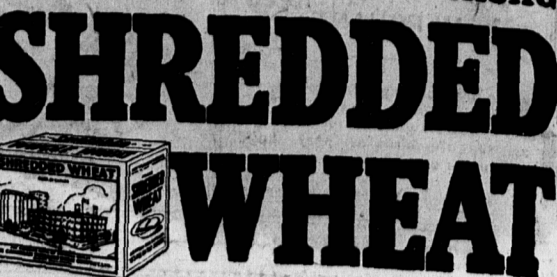
