740 CHILDREN RECEIVED TOXOIDE TREATMENT. Eight centres were visited during the week, thirty-five schools being included in the program. 632 school children were treated and 108 pre-school children, which made the total 740. 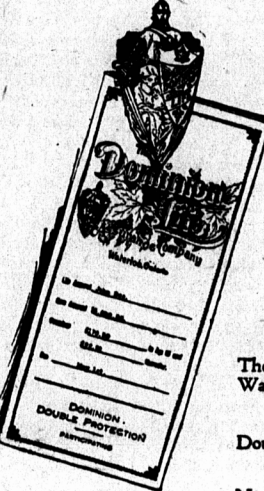
