A QUIET wedding took place at the residence of Mr. Fred. Heartz, Queen Street last night, when Miss Lottie J. Fleigher of this city, was united in marriage to Mr. Charles W. Rollins of Boston. Rev. G. P. Raymond, M. A., performed the ceremony. The bride was beautifully attired in a fawn broad-cloth costume with silk trimmings, and was attended by Miss Ethel Munn of Boston. The groom was supported by Mr. Fred. Heartz. Only the immediate friends of the bride were present. The bride is a sister of Mrs. F. H. Heartz. After the ceremony was performed a rich supper was served. The presents were numerous and costly.

GRAND SCOTCH RALLY.—One of the largest attended meetings of the Caledonia Club was held last evening at the Club rooms. Representatives from different parts of the Island were in attendance. All were in good humour and sang, story, and patriotic speeches were in order. After the club adjourned the club formed in line, (Capt Stewart in charge) and passed up Queen St. to Queen's Square. There were over 50 clansmen in the ranks. Headed by the club piper they formed in a ring and gave three cheers for Scotland. The turn-out and friendly feeling evidenced speak well for a grand turn out to day.

THESE are the days of union. The latest proposal, one that has been before the Masonic fraternity for some time, however, is for the formation of a Maritime Grand Lodge. At present Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island each has a separate Grand Lodge. The order of Oddfellows has a Grand Lodge with jurisdiction over the Maritime Provinces and the Masonic brotherhood seems to be of the opinion that a similar consolidation might be of advantage to them. The Grand Lodges of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island have pronounced in favor of it appointing delegates to meet the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, that meets in St. John on August 22nd. At this Conference the subject of union will be discussed and there is a possibility that New Brunswick will fall in line by also voting for union. Failing this, P. E. Island will unite with Nova Scotia. The three delegates from this province who will attend the meeting are Recorder Mac Coy, and Hon. J. W. Longley, of this city, and Judge Owen, of Annapolis.—Halifax Herald.

GEO'TOWN REGATTA

Seven Boats Sail a 24 Mile Course.

C. DELORY'S MARION

The Winner of Cup and Purse—Fine Sport in a Wash-board Breeze.

Georgetown, Aug. 9.—[Special]—

The regatta to-day at Georgetown was the most successful that has yet been held here. The weather was beautiful and there was what boatmen call a wash-board breeze.

The Kingfisher entered the harbor gaily decorated with bunting. The admirable arrangements were splendidly carried out by Capt. Kent who is also Commodore of the Georgetown Boating Club. Capt. Fitzgerald's steam launch was hired by the committee and did efficient service.

At 10 o'clock the Commodore's flag was lowered from the Kingfisher and hoisted aboard the steam launch, and the Commodore with the Sailing Committee accompanied by Mr. Justice Hodgson, placed a stake boat.

At 10.30 the preparatory gun was fired, giving notice to get ready. At 10.55 the blue ensign was hoisted from the cross-truck of the Kingfisher's mainmast.

At 10.58 the flag was lowered half-way. At 11 o'clock the starting gun was fired. The boats crossed the line in the following order:

The Mamie C., owned by John McPhee of Annapolis; Elizabeth, by Farmer; Marion, by Charles Delory, of Georgetown; Laura C. by Joseph Coulton, Georgetown; Bessie by John A. McDonald Georgetown; Myrtle E. by Charles Hemphill, Georgetown; James Allan, by C. W. McLellan, Georgetown; sailed about by Capt. Samuel Hemphill.

The course was over a distance of 24 miles as follows: Eastwardly into the Cove, round the buoy; Southwesterly around the stakeboat between the ferry wharves, thence out the harbor around the Black Point buoy off Panmure Islands; thence up the harbor and around the stake buoy between the wharves, and then over the same course again.

The boats finished in the following order: Marion, first; Laura C.; second; Myrtle E., third; James Allen, fourth; Bessie, fifth.

After the first round the Elizabeth was withdrawn. On the second an accident happened the Annapolis boat, the centre board becoming detached, putting her out of the race.

Mr. Delory thus wins the silver cup, the flag and a good substantial purse.

The tea party in connection with the regatta also passed off most successfully. There was a large attendance and the day proved a most enjoyable one.
