### Charlottetown's Historical Society

On Monday afternoon September 12, 1931, a meeting of prominent citizens was held in Charlottetown, P. E. Island to consider the question of forming an Historical Society. The invitation for the meeting set forth that Mr. Bulmer, Corresponding Secretary of the Nova Scotia Society, would be present and give information as to the objects, working, etc., of such societies.

On motion of Judge Alley, the Chief Justice, in the absence of the Lieut. Governor was called to the chair, and Thomas A. LePage was chosen Secretary.

The chairman, after stating briefly the object of the meeting, called on Mr. J. T. Bulmer to give an address.

In his remarks Mr. Bulmer referred to the importance of preserving the records of a country and the necessity of an Historical Society to see that this was systematically done and not left to chance. He spoke of the valuable materials of history in the possession of the Massachusetts Historical Society and that of Quebec. He narrated the fact that had been made to find one for Nova Scotia previous to 1878, when the present Society was established. He regretted the great loss that had arisen from the want of such an institution at an earlier time, and felt it of the greatest importance that an Historical Society for P. E. Island should be organized.

His Honor the Lieut. Governor now arrived and took the chair, the Chief Justice retiring.

After some remarks by Mr. Ed. Hodgson, Hon. L. H. Davies and Judge Alley, which touched on some facts of our early history and on the existence of important documents in the possession of private parties, the following resolution was proposed by Hon. D. Ferguson and seconded by Hon. L. H. Davies:

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this meeting it is desirable to form an Historical Society for Prince Edward Island, and that this meeting do now proceed to elect officers therefor, which shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Council of five."

This passed with the consent of all, and a committee, consisting of Judge Alley, Hon. D. Ferguson, and Wm. Heard, was appointed to solicit names for membership to form in conjunction with the names appended the original membership of the society.

Signatures were then asked to the following:

"The undersigned hereby agree to form themselves into an Historical Society, for Prince Edward Island, and agree to pay an entrance fee of five dollars and an annual subscription of two dollars, or such other annual sum as may be afterwards determined by the Society."

The following-named attached their signatures:

T. Heath Haveland, Edward Palmer, M. McLeod, Owen Connolly, Edward J. Hodgson, L. H. Davies, James Byrne, Charles C. Gardner, William Hoar, W. L. Cotton, T. A. LePage, F. W. Beer, Dr. Taylor, Frederick Brecken, A. McNeill, William C. DesBrisay, George Alley, R. D. Bambrick, William R. Watson, Henry Lawson, John W. Morrison, A. A. McDonald, John Ball, Thos. McKinlay, F. R. Bowers, Charles Palmer, Donald Ferguson, George W. Hodgson, Fred W. Hales, J. Crandall and D. Montgomery.

The name of Judge Young was also added, he having been unable to attend, but having sent a note expressing his interest in the formation of such a society and his readiness to subscribe \$10 or \$20 to the necessary expenses.

The members present then proceeded to the election of officers, which resulted as follows:

President—His Honor Governor Haveland.  
Vice-President—Chief Justice Palmer.  
Treasurer—Charles Palmer.  
Recording Secretary—T. A. LePage (pro tem).  
Committee—Judge Alley, Rev. Geo. W. Hodgson, Malcolm McLeod, Hon. Andrew A. McDonald and P. R. Bowers.

It was also understood that the President, Vice-President and Treasurer could be also members of the committee.

The appointment of a corresponding secretary was left to the committee above named.

A vote of thanks was passed and presented to Mr. Bulmer for his presence at the meeting, for his interest in the establishment of the society, and for the useful information he had given as to the methods and working of the kindred society of Nova Scotia.

A vote of thanks was also tendered to the Lieutenant-Governor for presiding over the meeting.

Acknowledgements being rendered, the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the executive.

### IN MEMORIAM

DONALD MONTGOMERY

There passed away to his eternal rest on May 22nd, under very sad circumstances, Donald MacLean Montgomery, 45 Coppington St., San Francisco, Cal., at the age of 55 years. While standing in the "Safety zone" on Mission St., he was struck by a hand car, which was being pursued by the police. He sustained a fractured skull and internal injuries from which he passed away a few hours later, having never regained consciousness.

He was born at Valleyfield, P. E. I. and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Angus Montgomery, of that place. In his early youth, he graduated from Prince of Wales College, and after teaching a few years in his native province, he went to San Francisco, where he has resided for the past 32 years.

He was the eldest of a family of ten, four of whom predeceased him. He is survived by one brother William, of Valleyfield, P. E. I., and four sisters, Annie, of Brookline, Mass.; Sara, of Brighton, Mass.; and Mrs. Nicholas Paul, of West Somerville, Mass., and Mrs. L. W. MacKinnon, Brooklyn, P. E. I.

His was a life not lived in vain, for though it was ever his practice not to "let his left hand know what his right hand doeth," those of us who knew him best and were his friends and comrades in the land of his adoption, know well that many a pilgrim over life's rough road had his load made lighter and his pathway brighter by Donald's generous and helping hand.

But while relatives and friends mourn and regret his passing, we know the parting is not forever, for we shall soon meet again in that better land.

The funeral, which was very largely attended, was held on May 27th and was under the auspices of the Caledonia Club and the Oddfellows Lodge, of which he was a member.

### BAND OF HOPE ORGANIZED

On the evening of Wednesday, June 15th, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Grand Supt. of Young Peoples work for the Sons of Temperance addressed quite a large gathering of young people on the subject "The evils of intemperance" in the Temperance Hall, Murray Harbor.

After Mr. Stavert had explained to the young people the meaning of a pledge and had impressed upon them the seriousness of promising to do something "upon their honor" and had urged all who could possibly do so, to sign the three-fold pledge against the use of intoxicating liquors, against the use of tobacco in any form and against the use of bad language, twenty-five of the young people came forward to the platform and signed the triple pledge.

### Disputes Columbus As Discoverer

HALIFAX, July 17.—(By The Canadian Press)—Believing he proved to the world that Columbus was not the first to discover America, Captain Gerhard Falergo is piloting his Viking ship Roald Amundsen back to Norway, over the course which tradition says Lief Erickson and his adventurous Norse travelled more than 900 years ago.

He believes too, he has proved that the Norsemen of today are just as daring as of old, because he has travelled some of the most dangerous waters of the world in a 60 foot craft fashioned after the Viking ships.

The tall figure-head on the bow, the red and white shields on the sides—attracted crowds to the waterfront as the Roald Amundsen sailed up Halifax harbor on Saturday after a trip from New York.

Captain Falergo and his crew of three will rest here until Tuesday, when they will set their square-rigged sail for Iceland.

One of a long line of navigators, Captain Falergo realized his life's dream when he built the Roald Amundsen in Norway two years ago and headed into the Atlantic under conditions little better than those of his forefathers.

First he went to Sweden, then to Denmark, Germany, England, France, Egypt and Spain. From Pelos, the port from which many adventurers sailed in Spain's more colorful days, he made the long, unbroken voyage to Havana in 59 days. From Havana he went to New Orleans, up the Mississippi to Chicago through the Great Lakes to Sarnia, Buffalo and later to New York, where he planned his homeward trip over the Viking trail.

He claimed the honor of having taken the first ship on the water trip from New Orleans to Minneapolis, which took four and a half months.

Recounting some of his experiences here, he said the Viking ship had been kept going through seas that raked it from bow to stern. At such times the man at the old-fashioned tiller had been tied with three ropes.

### NOVA SCOTIA EGG LAYING CONTEST, EXPERIMENTAL FARM, NAPPA, N. S.

At the end of the ninth four-weekly period, ending July 9, the birds in the Nova Scotia Egg Laying Contest at the Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S., have laid a total of 32,528 eggs, with a score of 33,108.1 points.

The leading pen to date is that of Mr. A. T. Reed, Hollingdam Station, N. B., Barred Rocks, with 1,512 eggs and 1,610.9 points. The second pen is the pen of Barred Rocks of W. J. White, Moore's Mills, N. B., with 1,555 eggs and 1,570.9 points. The third pen is a pen of Barred Rocks from the Nappan Farm with 1,438 eggs and 1,523.2 points.

The leading individual is Mr. A. T. Reed's Barred Rock, No. 82 with 174 eggs and 207.3 points. The second bird is Mr. C. D. Calder's White Leghorn No. 204 with 190 eggs and 204.4 points. The third individual is Mr. Reed's Barred Rock No. 85, with 172 eggs and 204.2 points.
