Balsamo Earns Three Teams Tied Speedy K. O. For First Place Over Seelig

NEW YORK, Oct. 14—(AP)—Harry Balsamo, the battering brakeman from the subway bounced Eric Seelig, German refugee, out of the Middleweight picture tonight with a speedy technical knockout in the first round of their 10 rounder in the New York Hippodrome.

Balsamo weighed 159 3-4 and Seelig 159 1-2.

The German, hailed as one of the best 160 pounders in Europe, hit the deck three times before Referee Johnny Marto waved him to his corner after 1:04 of one-sided battling in the opening heat.

Most of the experts had picked Seelig to stop the hard-hitting but erratic subway brakeman, whose surprise victory projected him into the front rank of challengers for champion Freddy Steele's Middleweight crown.

To Determine Eligibility Of U. S. Players

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Oct. 14—(C.P.)—Arthur J. Cayford, secretary, treasurer of the Montreal Indians of the Interprovincial Rugby Football Union, said tonight question of the eligibility of 10 United States players in the league had been thrown open again.

"A meeting of the League executives to consider three questions regarding the 'imports' has been called for Hamilton at 6 p.m. Friday," said Cayford.

The questions to be considered, Cayford said, were: the eligibility of 10 United States players recently declared ineligible, because of residence rules by the Board of Governors of the Interprovincial Union; protest of Toronto Argonauts over Ottawa Roughriders' use last Saturday of Tony Rowe and Stan O'Neil, two of those banned by the governors; and a suggestion from Hamilton Tigers that any Big Four team which in future plays a man declared ineligible, be barred from the Union.

Captures U. S. Senior Women's Golf Crown

RYE, N.Y., Oct. 14—(AP)—Mrs. Edward Stevens, of Round Hill, N.Y., today won the United States senior women's golf championship, with a two-day medal score of 174. This is Mrs. Stevens' first year as a member of the women's senior association. Mrs. Stevens' score of 93 today was 12 strokes higher than her first round when she carded an 81 under much better weather conditions. Her total was three strokes better than Mrs. W. Struel, her nearest rival.

Mrs. G. R. Hedges, of Columbus, Ohio, won the grandmother's prize with a low gross score of 191 for 36 holes.

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Bland, Allen To Fight Here October 26th

Seeking a rest after his strenuous fight activities during the summer, Big George Leslie of Souris, P.E.I., will leave shortly with his manager, Jim Pendergast of Kensington, for Northern New Brunswick on a hunting trip.

Leslie was formerly the Provincial heavyweight boxing champion. A "white hope" tournament winner, Jimmy Evans of Kensington, stripped him of his crown so George started the come back trail.

After a one-round knockout as a starter, Leslie entered this week's "Island white hope" tournament to establish a challenger to fight Evans. Leslie found little trouble winning the tourney by defeating young Ed Holland in the finals.

The victory assured Leslie of a chance to regain his crown from Evans.

MAKE FIGHT PLANS

Tommy Bland of Toronto, claimant of the Canadian Lightweight championship, and Bobby Allen, of Westville, N.S., will enter the ring in Charlottetown on Oct. 26, the fight being promoted by Joey McDonald of Charlottetown. Indications were the fight would be one of the best staged in Prince Edward Island in many years and a record crowd was expected to attend.

Allen has been campaigning in and about Boston under an American Manager and returned to his native province recently to score a knockout over Wildcat Carter of Boston in New Glasgow. Bland has an excellent record as a scrapper and plenty of fast action may be expected.

Arrangements were being made to have the winner of the fight in Charlottetown meet the Canadian welterweight champion, Gordon Wallace of British Columbia. Promoter McDonald said that the championship bout was practically assured and that Charlottetown would make every effort to bring the fight to Prince Edward Island if it were possible.

Wallace has an enviable record in the welterweights and fought Barney Ross recently, losing only by decision to the famous American scrapper.

Denies Ruth Or Lazzeri Slated To Handle Dodgers; Applications Flow In

NEW YORK, Oct. 14—(AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers will not hire Babe Ruth, Tony Lazzeri or any other American League man to manage the team, Stephen W. McKeever, 81-year-old President of the baseball club, said tonight.

"We have about 90 applications for the job, most of them from good men, and we ought to be able to get a good National League out of the lot," McKeever said.

Rumors circulated today that Lazzeri, veteran second baseman of New York Yankees, was being considered as the successor to Casey Stengel, deposed manager of the Dodgers.

"That's nonsense," roared McKeever.

Ruth insisted he still was eager for a chance at the job.

"I think Brooklyn has the best franchise in the National League," said the Babe, "and I think I'd probably have more actual cash value there than anywhere else."

Of the 90 applicants for the job, unconfirmed rumors point to these five men as the outstanding candidates: Burrell Grimes, manager of Louisville Colonels; Charley Dressen, manager of Cincinnati Reds; Zach Wheat, one-time Dodger star, Lazzeri and Ruth.

The rumor that Larry MacPhail, who will retire as vice-president and general manager of the Reds Nov. 1, would assume the same position with the Dodgers received some support when it was learned MacPhail has acquired living quarters in New York.

Bobby Orr Loses Fight

NEW HAVEN, CONN., Oct. 14—(CP)—Louis Kid Cocoa, New England Welterweight Champion, stopped Bobby Orr of Joggins, N. S., in the fourth round of a scheduled 10-round boxing match here.

A smashing right hook dropped Orr in Cocoa's corner and the bout was halted. Orr went down three times in previous rounds. He weighed 146 to the New Englander's 145 1-2.

The bout was a preliminary to that in which Carl Knowles, 179, of Savannah, Ga., won a technical knockout over Jackie Aldere, 176, of New York.

Fet Captures Cesarewitch In Upset

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 14—(CP Cable)—Fet, a grey five-year old gelding, today won the historic Cesarewitch stakes at Newmarket with last year's winner, Near Relation, a neck behind in second place. Third was Greynam.

Fet covered the 2 1-4 mile course in three minutes 53 seconds, lasting just long enough to withstand the closing challenge of Near Relation, owned by Sir Alfred Butt.

The winner was a 40-10-1 shot in the final call-over in London last night; but was quoted at 10 to 1 at the start of the race. By Son-In-Law out of Valda, Fet was ridden by Richardson and carried the low impost of 91 pounds.

Sydney Freeman owns the winner. He only purchased Fet a fortnight ago for steeple-chasing. But the gelding showed sudden improvement in flat racing. Freeman paid £1,000 for Fet, owned formerly by H. Hedges, with the proviso of a further £1,000 if he won the Cesarewitch. The race itself is worth approximately £2,000 to the winner.

The race was run in dull, showery weather. The field of 24 was closely bunched in the first half. Fet took the lead six furlongs from the finish and held it, though fading at the end.

Near Relation made a gallant bid to repeat his 1935 victory. Since the Cesarewitch was first run in 1839 no horse ever has won it two years running.

Riding the victor was a lucky break for Richardson as he was slated to ride Lord Harewood's Queen's Shilling. But Queen's Shilling was scratched yesterday.

The favorite, Lord Glanely's Buckleigh was not even among the first nine.

Hayden in a letter to C. D. Shipley of Amherst, Secretary of the Maritime Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

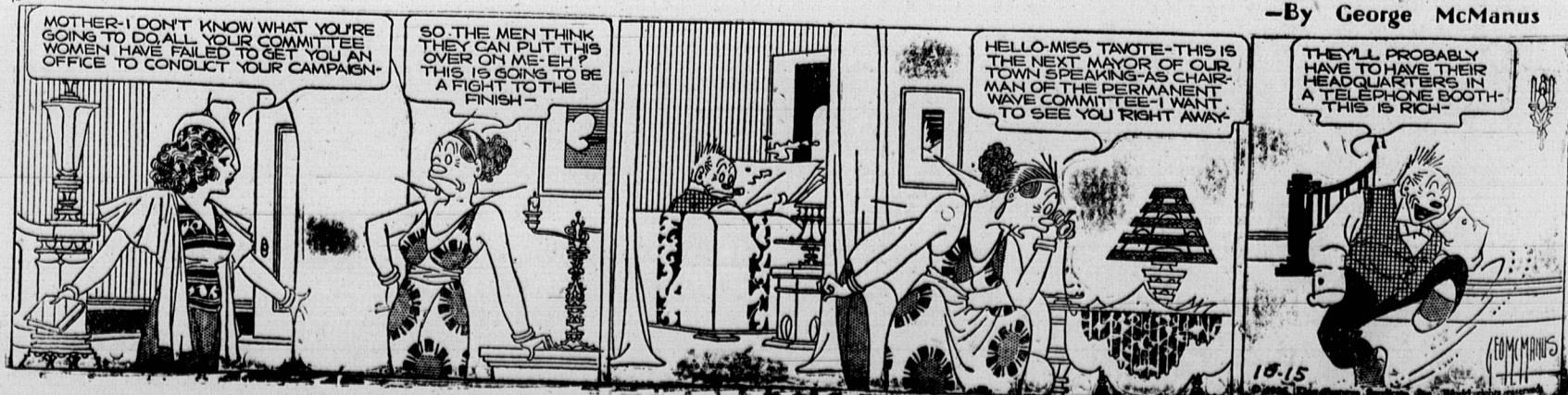
Mr. Hayden, President of the New Glasgow A.A.A., said the athletes had not explained why they did not attend.
