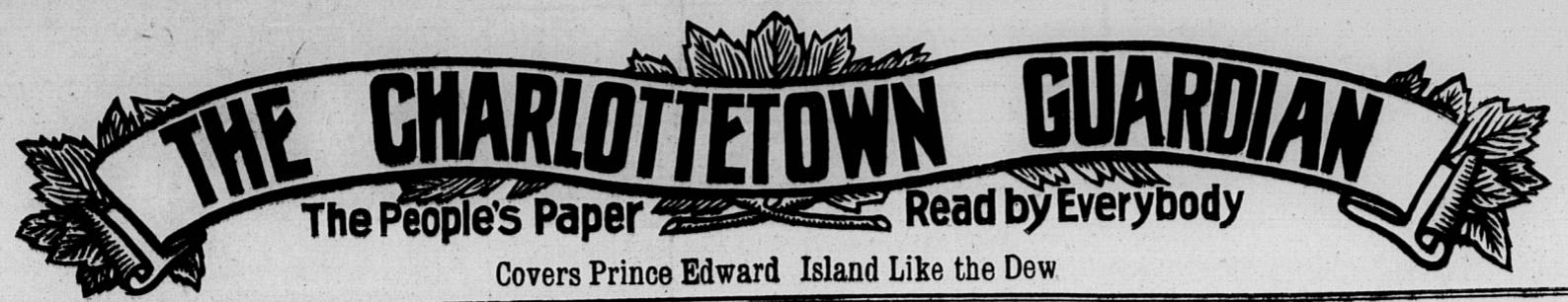

ANOTHER TRAGEDY OF SEA TAKES ITS TOLL

Visiting U. S. Potato Men Greatly Impressed With Splendid Island Product

EXTENSION OF PROVISIONS OF WAR PENSIONS

For Disabled Soldiers, Owing To Present Economic Conditions, Will Be Suggested To Federal Government.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 21.—Extension of the provisions of war pensions for disabled veterans, owing to present economic conditions will be suggested to the Federal Government by Mayor Wemp, on his arrival in Ottawa. He stated last night on his departure for the Capital, "we want no recurrence of what happened on Tuesday, when war veterans slept on the sidewalk awaiting the opening of the employment office to apply for jobs." The Mayor declared present conditions would justify such a policy he contended.

GRAPPLING WITH THE PROBLEM OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Representatives Of Every Province, Two Premiers And Various Delegates Meet In Centre Block, Parliament Buildings.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 21.—Representatives of every Province, two provincial Premiers, delegates from the C.M.A., the Canadian Council of Agriculture, the Railway Brotherhood and other organized bodies of employers and workers met in the centre block of the Parliament building today to grapple with the problem of national unemployment. The employment S.V.C. Council summoned by the new Minister of Labor, Senator Robertson was charged with the task of making specific recommendations to the Government for the alleviation of the present critical situation. The Department of Labor had attempted to make a census of the unemployment in the Dominion. Their estimate will be given to the Council today. An official estimate places the total at about 225,000.

Affected By Immigration Regulations

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 21.—Four Atlantic liners due at Halifax within the next four days have more than 200 passengers on board who will be affected by the new immigration regulations effective by Order in Council of August 14. They relate to ships leaving Europe on and after that date and bar admission to farm laborers, domestics, and others who formerly made up a large percentage of immigrants from the continent. Unless Ottawa authorities decide otherwise many will be refused admittance and may be forced to remain on the steamers. Immigration officials received official notice of the changes on Tuesday.

The "Reds" Suffer Smashing Defeat

Four Thousand Slaughtered By Chinese Govt. Troops—Their First Crushing Setback.

HANKOW, Aug. 21.—The slaughter of 4,000 Communists by provincial troops in Western Kwangsi Province and the capture of 2,000 "Red" rifles there, were reported today in Chinese press dispatches. This apparently is the first crushing defeat administered to the "Red" marauders, who have been murdering, looting and burning throughout the Yangtze Valley for several weeks. News of provincial victory followed closely word of the burning of Wusueh Hu-peh Province by Communists, who looted the city of 5,000 population and ransacked the countryside.

Except the Commodore King, none of those mentioned in this statement is a member of Parliament. The Islander owned by Col. J. N. Biggles, was wrecked near Powey last night and all on board were lost. Commodore King had the yacht under charter.

NEW POSSIBLE HEIR TO THE BRITISH THRONE

Duchess Of York Gave Birth To A Daughter Last Night—Great Rejoicing.

GLAMIS, Scotland, Aug. 21.—The Duchess of York, daughter-in-law of King George, tonight gave birth to a daughter. The joyful tidings were announced to the public by a huge beacon on top of Hunter's Hill, overlooking Glamis Castle, and the news went blazing over the countryside in the traditional Scottish fashion, columns of smoke and fire. It went even to Loosemouth, where Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald is spending a holiday. Within a few moments of the arrival of this new possible heir to the British Throne, King George and Queen Mary, who now are at Sandringham, were informed of the event.

Scottish Chambers Of Commerce Are Visiting Toronto

At 12.45 they leave for the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, where they will be entertained at luncheon as guests of the Toronto Board of Trade. In the afternoon they will be taken for a motor tour of the city, later proceeding to the Canadian National Exhibition Grounds for a private view of the British and overseas exhibits and the art gallery. They will leave at 8.15 a. m. the following day by steamer Niagara.

ANSWERS CALL OF SHIP IN DISTRESS

RESIDENTS OF MIMMINGASH NOTICING SHIP ON FIRE ABOUT EIGHT MILES OFF LAND, SEND MEN TO THE RESCUE WHO FIND ONE DROWNED, ANOTHER BURNED TO DEATH AND FOUR IN DYING CONDITION.

SUMMERSIDE, Aug. 21.—A steamer running down the coast, steaming north, was observed about six o'clock by people at Mimmingash to be afire. She burned for nearly two hours. It could not be ascertained whether she was completely burned or not. When first seen she was not many miles off Cape Wolfe. At the time she was seen to catch fire the steamer was about seven miles off the north west coast of Mimmingash. Her smokestack could be observed through the haze.

SHOCKING TRAGEDY IN ALBERTA HOME

EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 21.—First brutally shooting down his aged father and mother, and Mary Pechinet, aged 80 years, Jean Pechinet, Jr., 40-year-old farmer of the Thermen District, Northeast of Edmonton, ended his own life yesterday by literally blowing his head off with a charge from a shotgun.

Prominent St. John Man Dead

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Aug. 21.—James J. McGaffigan, prominent retired tea importer and dealer of this city and widely known throughout the Maritime Provinces, died in Hospital at Treceville, N.B., at noon today. He was on a visit to the North Shore and was taken ill at the weekend. Pneumonia developed and proved fatal.

TO THE RESCUE

Three large motor boats got under way and put off about seven o'clock for the scene of the fire. Those on the shore estimated that they would reach the steamer about 9 o'clock. Captain Kelly of the Brant, had left Mimmingash about four o'clock for Richibucto and would be well under the cliffs of Richibucto when the steamer caught fire. The steamer was seen to send up fire rockets before the fire burned out. Rev. John McDonald of St. Marks, Lot 7, got in touch with Mayor Lidstone of Summerside, who phoned to the Marine Department at Charlottetown.

When the motor boats returned they reported finding six men, one drowned, one burned to death and the remaining four unconscious and so badly burned that their lives are despaired of. Nothing could be discovered as to the name or destination of the ship. S.

Kings Co. Day At Exhibition

Livestock Parade Important Event In Day's Proceedings. 12,000 People Attended Big Fair Yesterday. Judging Completed.

The Live Stock Parade before the Grand Stand yesterday afternoon was one of the features of Kings County Day. With fine weather and an attendance of 12,000, good fortune and success followed the big Fair. Judging was completed in what ever classes remained. The Midway, the Exhibition Building and the horse races drew their usual crowds.

The formalities of the day were in the hands of Kings County people. At 11 a. m. His Worship Mayor MacDonald of Georgetown delivered a short address followed by Mr. E. B. McLaren, President of the Kings County Exhibition Assn. At 8 p. m. a much appreciated programme was presented by Kings County talent. His Worship Mayor MacDonald, presiding. President Paton introduced the Kings County people, and His Worship Mayor Prowse delivered an address of welcome. The livestock parade was held in the afternoon at the conclusion of the racing programme. Following was the order of procession: Mr. Resgh Horne mounted; ponies of Messrs. J. Walter Jones and Raoul Raymond; carriage horses; Pearchous; draft and general purpose horses; cattle paraded led by Mr. Charles Trenholme whose herd won the shield for beef cattle; Herefords led by Mr. Sanderson, North River; Holsteins led by J. Walter Jones; Guernseys led by Roper Bros.; Jerseys led by Stead Bros.; Winstoe, followed by Sample of Amherst and Bull from Brompton, Ont.

With twenty-nine entries in the Holstein classes J. Walter Jones, Sunbury, carried off twenty-one first prizes, winning in addition three championships, and two Grand Championships, also winning the T. Eaton Trophy against all breeds, and the Bank of Commerce special cup for junior heifer. The Grand Champion bull, Abegweit Hielme Franey, is partly owned by a breeders syndicate in Rustico, Messrs. Clark and Buntain. The Grand Champion cow, Maritime Nan Pietje, a five year old, is milking on official record, as high as 95 pounds a day. The Junior Championship heifer was sired by the Grand Champion bull.
