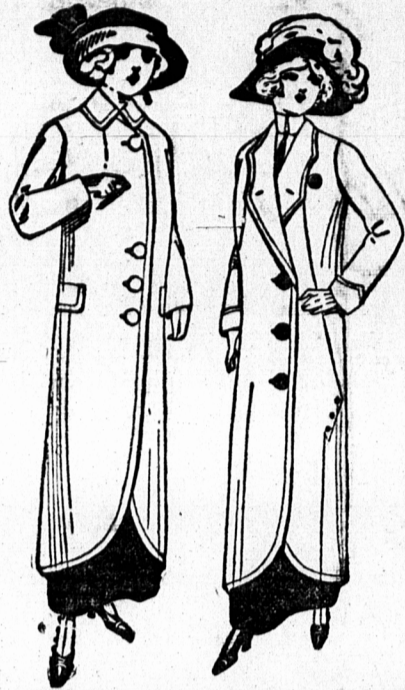

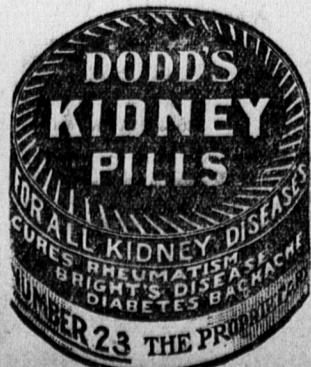

### IN MEMORIAM

MR. ANGUS McWILLIAMS.

Angus McWilliams was born in Eldon, Belfast, Prince Edward Island, Jan. 15, 1842. He was a son of John McWilliams and Mary Mc-



Donald, natives of Kirkcubright, Scotland.

After attending the Belfast Grammar School, he entered Prince of Wales College where he had as classmates Chief Justice Sullivan and Sir Louis J. Davis. Upon graduating he taught school a number of years, later returning for a Post Graduate Course. While teaching at Rosneath he rode six miles daily to Georgetown after school hours to take lessons in theology, church history and languages of Rev. Andrew Lornhead D.D., from Scotland in view of entering the ministry. Owing to ill health he was compelled to give up his study for the ministry and in 1870 removed to Boston where he engaged in mercantile life.

At Rosneath he married Florence E., the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Donnell and a granddaughter of Joseph Donnell, Esquire, a well known member of the Irish Bar. He became a member of the First Presbyterian Church, of which Rev. James B. Dunne, D.D., was pastor, in 1872.

Mr. McWilliams was ordained Elder of the First Church in 1881 by the then pastor Rev. W. Brenton Greene D.D., now Professor at Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, N. J., and has served continuously in the Eldership of that Church. He became identified with the Evangelistic work of the Y. M. C. A., during the period that Rev. Dr. Deming, later pastor of the Bowdoin Square Baptist Tabernacle, was secretary. Later Elder McWilliams was appointed Missionary for the Sunday School Board of the Presbyterian Church. He was a delegate from the Boston Presbytery to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church held at Winona Lake, Ind., where he was singularly honored as one of the four ruling Elders designated to officiate at the communion which opened the proceedings; the other three being President Harrison of the United States, Governor Mount of Indiana and Hon. John Wanamaker of Philadelphia.

As a representative of the Boston Presbytery he was especially authorized to officiate during the absence of the various clergymen from their parishes and as such filled the pulpit in the majority of the Presbyterian Churches in New England. For many years he has been a member of the Ministerial Association of the Presbyterian Ministers,

serving at various times as its secretary.

He has been a contributor to both religious and secular press. He retired from active business twenty-five years ago.

He leaves a family of four, Mrs. Mary A. Dyer, Miss Florence F. and Annie E. McWilliams and John A. McWilliams, all of Boston and two sisters, Miss Mary and Jessie McWilliams living in Eldon, Prince Edward Island.

Funeral services were held in the First Presbyterian Church, Columbus Avenue and Berkeley Street, Boston, on Friday, November 21, 1913 at 2 p. m.

The officiating clergymen were the Rev. William M. Tufts D.D., pastor of the church, Rev. James Alexander D.D., a former pastor, who delivered the eulogy, Rev. D. B. McLeod, recently of Orwell and Rev. Herbert A. Manchester, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, East Boston, and present Moderator of the Boston Presbytery.

The musical portion of the services was in charge of Professor H. A. Ripley, organist, assisted by Mrs. Annie McDonald, soprano, and Mr. Alexander Barclay, tenor.

MRS. H. C. COX.

The death occurred at Morrell yesterday morning of Mrs. H. C. Cox, aged 29, beloved wife of Mr. Harry H. Cox. The deceased became ill five years ago, and since then has spent two winters at Saranac Lake, under special treatment. Her last visit there was about three years ago. On her return she rallied for a time and appeared to be improving, but it was a case of hoping against hope, for, despite her optimism and gallant struggle against the disease, despite the most devoted and loving attention, her friends realized that death had marked her for his own. Her passing away at the comparatively early age of 29 will be a heavy blow to the bereaved husband and other relatives. Mrs. Cox was a daughter of the late Mr. Donald McLaine of St. Peter's Bay. She leaves to mourn, besides her husband and one son, Herbert, a mother, one brother, Roy, and one sister, Miss Lottie McLaine, whose self-sacrificing devotion to her invalid sister brightened the pathway of the sufferer during her illness. The deceased possessed a lovable Christian character and her qualities of mind and heart made for her many warm friends, who learn with sorrow the sad news of her death.
