**FUR COAT AND SKIRT POPULAR**  
PARIS, Feb. 2.—So far this winter the three-quarter coat of the cloth or dreyton, trimmed with wide bands of fur, about the hem and sleeves, and boasting a deep fur collar, has been preferred by many women to the all-fur wrap, but now holds the skirt as well as the coat of peltry! The coat is fashioned in the hips to a blouse or some gorgeous tulle, the far flaring in points, scallops, or squares, so as to avoid a hard line. The skirt is belted low with a girde made of enamel plaques, held together by links of metal, over which is pomponed slightly. The lining is of similar material to the blouse. The all-fur collar, which finds a place on many of the newest evening wraps, does not match the actual cloak, but the lining. Thus a black chiffon wrap, lined with purple, would have purple silk, or velvet passion flowers, or roses, forming the collar. Some of the more utilitarian cloaks show linings of a delicate shade at the top, the lower portion being of a very much darker hue, the two being joined by a narrow band of handsome embroidery.

So far, influenza has not been reported here, but this warning comes in anticipation of the disease spreading from other places where it is prevalent. "Cut out the everlasting handshake" warns Dr. Young, among other suggestions.

**HUGE FLOCK OF CROWS**  
THANSONVILLE, N. Y., Jan 31.—Thousands of crows driven from more exposed places by the bitter cold have formed in a huge flock on the flat lands between Sonsea and Groveland. Farmers and motorists report acres of the low lands literally covered with the birds, huddled together in the grass and weeds to keep from freezing. Many already have died from exposure and lack of food.

**"WILL REJECT THEM"**  
The high commissioner for South Africa has issued a warning to intending immigrants that they will be rejected from that country unless they are provided with written evidence of definite employment or sufficient capital to maintain themselves for at least six months. Previously £20 capital was sufficient qualification.

The new restrictions are due to the continued congestion of the labor market in South Africa.

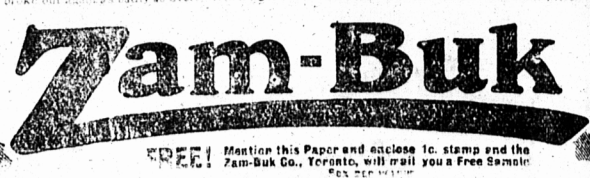
