UNDER THE WHITE ENSIGN.—The April number of "The Sailor," the official organ of the Navy League of Canada contains several illustrations of young Canadian officers of the Royal Naval Volunteers. Among the number is a splendid portrait of Lieut. William S. Gordon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gordon of Charlottetown, of whom it says: "Lieut. Gordon was born at Charlottetown, P. E. I. He is 28 years of age. At the age of 17 he entered the Merchant Marine, and sailed at various times in square-rigged, steam and surveying ships. Lieut. Gordon was in China nearly five months during the revolution which proclaimed a republic in the Celestial Empire. He was also a spectator at the Harbor when King George was crowned Emperor of China. During the Turco-Italian War he was engaged in blockade running, and had some very interesting experiences. He left Canada for overseas as a sub-lieutenant in August, 1916, and owing to his qualifications, was promoted to first lieutenant. During the period of hostilities he has served with the Second, Ninth and Tenth Squadrons of the British Fleet.
