**MR. BLAIR'S RESIGNATION.**

Mr. Blair's resignation of the Chairmanship of the Railway Commission affords a sensation barely second to that caused by his first resignation from the Laurier Cabinet. At that time he gave up \$8,000 a year and an important portfolio to signalise his opposition to the Grand Trunk Pacific contract. He now gives up an equally important position, with more assured tenure and a salary of \$10,000 a year to publicly reaffirm his opposition thereto.

We long ago said that the appointment of Mr. Blair to that position and his acceptance of it at the time was little creditable to the Government or to him. The Government was getting rid of a formidable opponent; he was permitting his mouth to be closed with a sop. So it appeared at the time. Mr. Blair's present resignation and outspoken words relieve him from any imputation of sordid motives. It is a second blow straight from the shoulder at his late leader and colleagues. He will now speak and he will have the ear of the

country. It may be difficult for him to avoid re-entering political life, which he will undoubtedly be asked to do. That he has "no present intention" to do so settles nothing. He may change his mind.

**OUR IMPROVED NEWS SERVICE.**

Not every one sends or receives telegraph messages, but in these days every intelligent citizen reads the newspapers. And in this way every one shares in the advantage of the improved telegraph service. In this connection The Guardian is daily receiving commendation for its greatly improved news service. Reduced rates have enabled us to double the quantity of telegraphic news from the outside world.

What is of even more importance is that the news is brought down to a much later hour than heretofore. It is fresh and crisp. Yesterday important despatches from St. Petersburg and Tokyo respectively embodied the latest war news known in those cities during the afternoon and evening before. All of our telegraphic news is from four to twelve hours later than it was under the old system.

We are now giving our readers what was never before enjoyed on Prince Edward Island, the latest news of the important happenings all over the world to be read at their breakfast tables. And we have abundant evidence that the improvement is appreciated by the reading public. All past records in circulation have been broken. And we believe that our up-to-date news service will be more and more valued by a still increasing number of readers as the months roll by.

**TWO GREAT ISSUES.**

Two of the greater issues in the political campaign now being fought are the Transcontinental Railway contract and increased protection for Canadian industries. The people of Prince Edward Island have only the interest of taxpayers in the big railway scheme. The road will not touch our shores; the expenditure will be entirely beyond our Island boundaries. Conservatives are, of course, opposed to the scheme and Liberals far from being enthusiastic over it. But this is only one of the two great issues. "Ad-quate protection" is another issue put forward by Mr. Fordean, the Opposition leader. The phrase is a vague one.

In the minds of the Liberal party, of most of our Island people of both parties, as we think, and in the judgment of The Guardian, we have adequate protection now. We have been told again and again by the Conservative press and by Conservative speakers that the Liberal party have adopted with slight modifications the protective policy of their predecessors in office. Our manufacturing industries throughout the country are suffering; on the contrary they have during recent years prospered as they seldom or never prospered before. We have no hesitation in saying that the interests of Prince Edward Island, where so few factories exist, do not require a higher tariff than we now have. And if the "adequate protection" of Mr. Fordean does not mean higher protection than exists, what does it mean? Will the Examiner enlighten us on this point?

**THE KING'S COUNTY JUDGESHIP.**

The Guardian learns that H. J. Palmer, for some years a member of the Legislature and Stipendiary Magistrate, is an aspirant for the King's County Judgeship vacated by the resignation of Hon. A. B. Warburton. We mention his name as we have before mentioned other names. He has untroubled claims upon his party, and is a man of good character and ability. There are, however other things than party claims to be considered in making an appointment of this kind. We think an appointment ought to be promptly made before the election, and in no way contingent upon the results of the political contest. To keep the appointment open is to bring about another scramble among the increasing number of applicants, similar to that which occurred in regard to the Lieutenant Governorship, with disturbing effect locally and embarrassment at Ottawa. In any case the Government must face the responsibility for any appointment when made.

No judicial appointment should be kept open to become the subject of dicker, or to suit the convenience or the exigencies of political controversies. Hesitancy in regard to appointments has hitherto distinctly weakened the Liberal party in this Province. We do not anticipate that our words will greatly influence the authorities at Ottawa, and at the same time we feel that we express the best public opinion and indicate the course of common prudence when we recommend the prompt filling up of important positions as early as may be after they become vacant. It is a sound rule generally, and is especially so when the vacant position is a judicial one.
