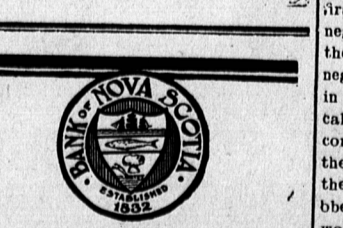

CANADA'S BIRTHPLACE

A correspondent directs our attention to the following paragraph which appeared in a recent issue of the Pall Mall Gazette, London: "Where was the Dominion of Canada born? Not many folk, perhaps, could supply the correct answer."

In supplying "the correct answer," the Pall Mall Gazette is a little astray. The first step in the movement looking towards the union of the British North American colonies was the conference held in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, in 1864, when delegates from the three Maritime colonies, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, met to consider a union of these three colonies.

ed into a series of resolutions which were made the basis of the final legislation. In 1886 delegates from the colonies met at the Westminster Palace Hotel in London and crystallized the Quebec resolutions into the British North America Act. This Act was passed by the Imperial Parliament and received the Queen's assent in March, 1867. This Act was proclaimed throughout the new Dominion of Canada on July 1, 1867.

The Dominion of Canada, then, was born in Charlottetown, nursed and fed in Quebec, and christened in London.

THOSE BOYS

Complaints are made regarding the conduct of certain young savages on Queen Square on band nights, and also of their wanton destruction of property. The bandstand, recently painted and fitted up, has already been disfigured, flowers, shrubbery and trees on the square, which all decent citizens take pride in seeing at their best, are not even respected by these people and, as a result, the boys who would, under different conditions, be ready to make expenditures for the beautifying of the city have almost concluded that any further expenditure would only be wasted.

SAFETY AT SEA

Little surprise was evinced at the conclusion arrived at by the Commission investigating the collision of the Empress of Ireland and the Storstad, in placing the blame on the latter. The trend of the evidence from first to last pointed to such a conclusion, and the verdict will again emphasize the arguments urged by those who have been protesting against the free admission of Norwegian vessels to Canada's coasting trade.

Although the Commission did not charge the officers of the Storstad with incompetence, it charged the first officer with being "wrong and negligent in altering his course in the fog, and that he was wrong and negligent in keeping the navigation in his own hands and in failing to call the captain when he saw the fog coming on." His orders were to call the captain when anything out of the ordinary occurred and he disobeyed his orders. The disobedience would doubtless have been overlooked had nothing happened, but disobedience of orders is always culpable whether anything happens or not.

The British trained seaman seldom disobeys orders although even Lord Nelson virtually disobeyed orders on a certain memorable occasion when he failed to see a signal with his blind eye. The Commission made many suggestions with a view to avoiding similar disasters in the future, such as "closing all watertight doors and portholes below the top of the watertight bulkheads in foggy weather and to keep them closed until the fog has cleared, and to keep them closed at night;" also "that it might be desirable to consider whether rats could not be placed in such a position on the upper deck that they would float automatically on the water as the ship sank."

to have sane rules and to obey them. Rules are made deliberately; they are obeyed or disobeyed at the critical moment according to training or the want of it. Competent men in charge of ships and unflinching obedience of orders will do more to prevent accidents at sea than the findings of many Commissions.

NOTES

The Summer School of Science has now been in session in Charlottetown for a little over a week. We understand the course of study is a strenuous one and teachers and students have been "hard at it" since they began. While, doubtless, the main object of the school is study, we hope that the recreation and social features will not be entirely lost sight of. Citizens have, so far, had few, if any, opportunities of intercepting and becoming acquainted with the visitors in their walks to and from the college. So far it has been "all work and no play," a course which, proverbially as well as in fact, has a detrimental effect upon "Jack." We know that our citizens are anxious to give the visitors some idea of the summer glories of the Garden of the Gulf and hope an opportunity will be given them to do so before the weariness of hard work makes enjoyment impossible.

OUR LONDON LETTER

(From our own Correspondent.) LONDON, July 3.—"It is not really an election which is so much demanded by the people as a settlement, and an election seems to me at the present time to give the least chance of securing it." This criticism from the Archbishop of York on the Second Reading of the Amending Bill in the House of Lords on Wednesday of this week indicates how Unionists are now pressing, not for party advantage, but to avert the disaster of civil war. Whatever may be said about the "Willehards," as represented by Lord Willoughby de Broke and a few followers who were in favor of flat rejection of the Amending Bill, the majority of the Opposition are evidently trying to show some readiness to compromise on Home Rule, and in this attitude they are supported by The Times which, commenting on the debate said: "The duty of the Opposition in the House of Lords at this moment is a duty which rises above mere party considerations: it is to do their best to prevent civil war."

Unhappily, although this conciliatory spirit prevails at Westminster, the same does not apply to Ireland, where the tension is daily becoming more strained, and is manifesting itself in various and disturbing incidents. The temper of both Unionists and Nationalists is now so distrustful that both are showing the greatest anxiety to arm themselves corporately and individually. Interference with Ulster despatch riders has resulted this week in an order from His Majesty's Government for the carrying of open armaments if deemed necessary for protection.

The policy of the Opposition in regard to the passage of both the parent bill and the Amending bill, was clearly outlined by Lord Lansdowne, who in regard to the latter declared their single object would be to convert "this defective exclusion bill into a real and adequate exclusion bill." As to the parent bill they would not attempt to reject it but would oppose on second reading; whenever it was taken. The Archbishop of York went much further, and after saying that exclusion ought not to be the last word of the House of Lords, proposed that a statutory commission should be appointed, consisting of two bodies, one to frame an acceptable measure of self-government for Ireland, and the other to consider the matter from the point of view of the United Kingdom.

not quite so largely attended as in some years. It was the first Dominion Day dinner that lacked the presence of Lord Strathcona, to which fact suitable reference was made by the Hon. George H. Perley who presided. Chief among the group of distinguished guests was Prince Alexander of Teck, Governor-General designate of Canada, who in replying to the toast of the Dominion, expressed his confidence in its future. A message from Sir Robert Borden in which the Premier asserted that the Canadian people were firmly resolved to assume and perform their just part in maintaining the integrity of the Empire, was most cordially received by the gathering.

In the afternoon of the same day Hon. Mr. and Mrs. Perley were "At Home," being kept busy for two hours in receiving numerous visitors. Those of the afternoon, Mr. Perley has recently made it clear that he has not come to London as Acting High Commissioner, but that as a member of the Cabinet in London he is commissioned to transact business for the Government and to look into the requirements of the office with a view to reporting thereon at the close of the summer, when it is expected a definite successor to the late Lord Strathcona will be named.

Tragedy is a word writ deep in the history of the reigning House of the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy, so much so that the most determined opponent of fatalism stands aghast before the awful record. Only a few months ago the dead Archduke, Franz-Ferdinand, heir to the Emperor Franz-Josef was in London, with his consort who has shared his fate. In the prime of life, well built physically and showing strong mental individuality, there was little to suggest that he would not in due course, come to the throne of the Habsburgs. Yet last Sunday night the newshoys were rapidly selling editions telling the horrible story of the double assassination. The fatal shots were discharged by a Serbian youth who in his own confession was deeply imbued with anarchist ideas and particularly with the desire to kill a member of the royal family. But it appears that even if that attempt had failed, as did earlier bomb attempts, there were several other conspiracies hatched for the occasion of the Archduke's visit to the Serbian City. The dead Archduke paid the penalty of adopting a decided policy in favor of one section of the Kingdom, and it yet remains to be seen whether there will ever be more far reaching effects of this internecine hatred between the Teutonic and the Slave elements of the dual monarchy.

The manly art of wearing the gloves which in the Victorian era was frowned upon both by society and by the Puritan elements of the nation seems as though it is once more coming into the good graces of both. When Lord Balfour of England and Colin Bell of Australia, faced each other in the ring at Olympia this week, the master of ceremonies was a clergyman, known for his support of the boxing art, and among the crowd of spectators were many ladies of title. Naturally the action of these ladies has been much discussed and some varying opinions have been expressed as to the propriety of feminine patronage of the ring.
