Mr. Richard Hunt, American Consular Agent has received a despatch from United States Secretary Hay, ordering the American flag to be placed at half mast over his office for 30 days in memory of the death of Ex-Pres. Harrison.

A TELEGRAM received in Summerside from Rev. W. H. Smith announces the death on Saturday last of his father, Mr. Alexander Smith, of New Glasgow, N. S., to whose bedside he had been summoned a few days ago. Mr. Smith is expected to arrive home to-day (Wednesday).

I., and being acquainted with his father, went to the drill shed, to enquire after Roy. I found him, and I was glad that he had been chosen first in about 60 two hundred to go to S. Africa and when the young P. E. Islander was tested at horse-back riding he opened the eyes of the officers, and they said he is an expert and looked as if he had been accustomed to it all his life, and he was at once appointed Corporal of section No. 1."

A LETTER received from Theological Seminary, Bangor, Maine, March 18th, 1901, says: Mr. William J. Campbell formerly of Summerside, who is a student in the junior class of this institution, is now sick with typhoid fever. Mr. Campbell is one of the most successful and popular students in the Seminary, and yesterday when the physician in charge pronounced his case typhoid fever, expressions of sorrow and sympathy were heard from all. The Faculty who prize him as a student and esteem him as a Christian gentleman, are very solicitous in his behalf. To-day a trained nurse has taken charge, and within a few days he will be removed to the hospital where he will receive special treatment. Everything possible is being done for him and hopes are entertained for his recovery.

THE Moncton Times says: Mr. W. S. Bowness, the well known uptown watchmaker, had a very close call from death last Friday afternoon as the result of the careless and reckless handling of a rifle in the hands of some unknown person. Mr. Bowness was walking up the wharf track, from Lea's mill, when he suddenly heard the whiz of an unseen missile of some sort and at the same time felt a slight vibration at the top of his head. Simultaneous with the whiz of the bullet, which the missile turned out to be, Mr. Bowness heard the report of a rifle to the north of the track, and upon examination he found that the bullet had pierced the top of his soft felt hat, barely escaping his head. Mr. Bowness felt thankful about that time that he was not an inch or two taller. It is supposed that the stray bullet came from some of the back yards in that locality where some indiscreet and reckless persons were indulging in rifle practice. From the size of the hole in his hat Mr. Bowness judges that the bullet came from about a No. 22 calibre rifle. The law against the use of firearms within the city limits should be more rigidly enforced, and some steps should be taken to discover where the stray bullet came from, which came so nearly ending in the death of the citizen in question on Friday. [The Mr. W. S. Bowness referred to is a son of Mr. William Bowness of Summerside and was employed with Mr. Leonard Morris, Summerside, as a jeweller. He was also the leader of the Summerside Cornet Band.]
