PLANTS FATAL TO LIVESTOCK With reference to the fact that poisonous plants, principally death camas of the lily family accounted for 11.2 per cent of the deaths of sheep in Western Canada during a survey of 1929-31 and that recently cattle were poisoned by larkspur (buttercup family). The following are some of the more common plants dangerous to livestock: Horses: ergot, bracken, horsetail, dandel, purple cockle, locoweed, water hemlock. Cattle: ergot, bracken, dandel, purple cockle, cursed crowfoot, larkspur, locoweed, poison hemlock, water hemlock, water pasnip, laurel, white snakeroot, ragwort. Sheep: ergot, dandel, death camas, purple cockle, pasque flower, lupine, locoweed, poison hemlock, water hemlock, laurel, white snake-root. Swine: dandel, purple cockle, water hemlock. Poultry: ergot, dandel, purple cockle and other injurious seeds in screenings.

Hay or Seed, Which?

For many months past the hay market has been very dull and prices decidedly low. In the more important commercial hay growing areas in Canada there will probably be substantial carry overs, especially in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, owing to failure of export markets. It is known that for the year ending March 31, 1933, only 24,523 tons have been exported as against 150,000 tons in 1930 and about 500,000 tons in some previous years.

The principal export markets for Canadian hay have been in Great Britain and the United States, following partial failure of the hay crops in those countries. It happens that for the last two years both these countries have had good hay crops with the result that their requirement of extra supplies from Canada was very small.

The inability to depend upon hay as a cash crop has led many Canadian farmers in recent years to let their timothy fields ripen to harvest for seed. This change from hay to seed production has in most instances been highly encouraging and has been especially profitable when care was exercised in the choice of fields to be cut for seed and in the handling of the seed crop to ensure of its being free of ox-eye daisy and other troublesome weed seeds. Canada could greatly increase her production of timothy seed before exceeding the amount required for home consumption.

The advisability of harvesting timothy as seed rather than hay will depend in large part upon the prospect of marketing hay in Great Britain or the United States. Information as to hay prospects in both these countries should be available by July 1st, which would ordinarily be early enough to allow Canadian farmers to choose as between making their timothy crops into hay or harvesting them as seed.

SLIP COVERS

Slip covers are a real help to many a woman who is trying to make her living room attractive. Sometimes they are used to bring colour into an otherwise dull room; sometimes they are used to change the colour and to make a chair of the wrong shade blend into a harmonious whole.

More often they are used as a measure of economy to cover shabby upholstery. Twice lately I have seen them used very effectively for this purpose. One was a very large comfortable overstuffed chair. Lovely to sit in, but literally to shreds. A slip cover was made for this from a coarse piece of unbleached cotton—the kind that is frequently called "factory cotton." It was dyed a deep cream shade with coffee and looked remarkably well and did not betray its humble origin.

A pair of wicker chairs were given new life by the use of slip covers. These chairs were hopelessly shabby but slip covers of an English-looking chintz rejuvenated them.

Slip covers may be purchased all ready to fit onto your chairs or Chesterfield, but they are more expensive than home made ones. It is quite an undertaking to make a slip cover for a Chesterfield but anyone who is handy with a needle can manage a chair slip cover. Draft your pattern on paper and do your experimenting with it before you put scissors into your material. It is wise to pin it until you have the desired result before doing the actual sewing.
