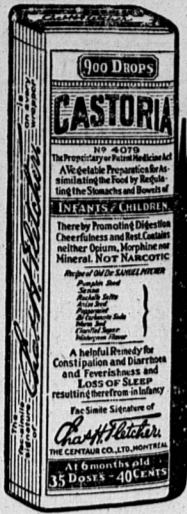

Plan Air Service For Western Africa

LONDON, Jan. 21.—A vision of airways linking some of the more remote territories of empire is raised by the report of a visit paid by W. A. Campbell, one of the civil aviation officers of the Air Ministry, to West Africa.

Nigeria, Gambia, the Gold Coast, Sierra Leone—these are names not yet to be found in any guide book to world airways. The great air route soon to be opened through Africa from Cairo to Cape Town lies thousands of miles to the east; the French terminus of the air mail line from Paris and Morocco, is, it is true, at Dakar, a small town in French Senegal only 100 miles from Bathurst in the Gambia, but no air connections yet exist. Aeroplanes are seldom seen in most parts of this vast area. Royal Air Force bombers which recently traversed Africa from Khartoum to Bathurst flew many hundreds of miles through virgin air, passing over great tracts where airmen had never previously ventured.

Problems connected with the establishment of a flying boat service from Calabar, Nigeria, to French Senegal, are enjoying the close attention of experts and of the Colonial Office. Along this route, measuring 2,300 miles of coast line, the fly-

ing machines would call at Bathurst, Bolama (Portuguese Guinea), Freetown, Monrovia (capital of the negro state Liberia), Grand Bassam (French Ivory Coast), Takoradi, the great port in the Gold Coast, and Lagos. Then inland, up the Niger River, amphibious planes might penetrate nearly a thousand miles to a junction at the town of Zinder with the Franco-Belgian airway across the Sahara to Europe.

PRINCE ENJOYS AN ITALIAN HAIRCUT

LONDON, Jan. 21.—The Prince of Wales, in preparation for his South American trip, familiarized himself with all Spanish customs—even to haircuts.

Recently M. Aturia, a Spanish hairdresser, answered his telephone. "This is the Prince of Wales speaking," said the voice, "can you come to Burrough Court to cut my hair?"

Naturally M. Aturia could, he was whirled away from his little shop in a motor belonging to Prince George.

"I was nervous at first," he said later. "But the Prince put me at ease by talking in Spanish, fluently."

Too Smart For Jack Dempsey

Did you ever hear of a certain Canadian fighter who was so smart that the great Jack Dempsey kicked him out as a sparring partner? We are referring to Larry Gains who has recently been fighting in Europe and has 14 bouts without a loss to his credit. When Dempsey was in training for his bout with Sharkey in 1927, Gains was one sparring partner whom he failed to send to the cleaners. In the first tryout Dempsey was unable to mop up the colored boy from Canada, so he lined him up for the next day when Rickard was to be present with about 300 newspapermen among whom were Benny Leonard, J. J. Corbett, Wilbur Wood, and James J. Romano. The bell rang and Larry jumped out to meet Dempsey in his own corner. In the middle of the round Dempsey ran into Larry's glove and emerged with a bleeding nose. After the round Playfair Brown began to remove Gains's gloves but Dempsey asked for another session. Gains repeated in the second and again more than held his own with the Manassa Mauler. That night Leo Flynn told Brown that Gains would no longer be needed. "What's the matter?" asked Brown. He is a smart boxer. "Too smart," was the curt answer. "Who do you think those newspapermen came up here to see, Gains or Dempsey?"

FAMOUS OPERA SINGER SUES MAN FOR LIBEL STORY

VIENNA, Australia, Jan. 21.—Viennese society packed the courtroom at the opening here of the case in which Roderich Muller-Guttenbrunn, the novelist, is being sued by Mme. Jertiza, the famous primo donna for having written a slanderous book based on her life. The title of the book is "Baggage, or the Story of a Singer."

Mme. Jertiza is suing for the suppression of the book, which she says, contains no fewer than 63 separate slurs on her honor.

Her husband, Baron Leopold Popper-Podhragy, and his private secretary, Captain Paul Lueftner, are also suing the novelist as well as the publishing firm of Fiba, Mme. Jertiza's cousin, Baron Schenk, and Mme. Jertiza's former private secretary, Grete Lelms-Lainburg. Mme. Jertiza has also filed a suit against these others.

The primo donna alleges that the novel presumes to reveal the private life of herself, her husband, and her associates.

A revelation which caused surprise in the court was that the publishing firm of Fiba is owned by a Mrs. Olga Bauer-Pilecka, a singer, who was recently dismissed from the State Opera, and who seems to have been Guttenbrunn's main source of information.

Guttenbrunn, in the witness-box, said he did not mean to portray Mme. Jertiza. He admitted that some parts of his book were about Mme. Jertiza's husband, and also that he had made use of the revelations made during Mme. Jertiza's lawsuit against her secretary.

Herr Deval, a book dealer, said that a representative of Fiba told him that the novel contained some "fine things" and that the singer mentioned in it was Mme. Jertiza.

The chief shippers for this vicinity are Pool & Thompson, Montague and Cook & Son and Fred Johnston, Murray River. The outlets thus afforded for spuds bring a continuous and welcome revenue to farmers during the winter months.

GERMAN RECOVERS BOTTLE OF MONEY

SYDNEY, Australia, Jan. 21.—After a two days' inquiry by the city coroner he has decided on the right-

ful owner of 211 sovereigns, and 13 half-sovereigns which were found by a Boy Scout in the undergrowth near Sirius Cove in October 1929.

It was stated at the time of the discovery that the sovereigns which were in a bottle, had been buried for safety in the undergrowth by Herr Thiel, a German, as the outbreak of war.

Recently Thiel had searched the locality for his treasure, but because of the changed appearance of the landscape he was unable to find it.

The coroner found that Thiel was the rightful owner of the money, and suggested he should give the Scout fifty of the sovereigns as a reward.
