**THE WHITE PLAGUE.**

The series of experiments carried on by Dr. Salmon, chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States, and their results, which were described by him in a paper read before the American Veterinary Medical association, appear to have demonstrated the identity of the human and bovine tubercle bacilli and the transmissibility of the disease from men to cattle. The experiments were conducted upon an extensive scale and by independent investigators. Nine cultures says an exchange in describing the experiment were isolated, derived from human beings. These were compared with virulent bovine cultures and two of them were found to be identical. These were tried on rabbits, guinea pigs, hogs and calves and 50 per cent. of the cultures from children were found virulent for cattle. Dr. Mohler also obtained virulent bacilli from the human subject. One goat inoculated died in 37 days, another in 95 days and a cat in 23 days. The conclusion drawn by Dr. Salmon is that while some human bacilli do not produce fatal results in cattle, others do. Touching the transmissibility of bovine bacilli to the human Dr. Salmon held that human and bovine tubercloses are identical or that, being different, the bovine form is transmissible to man and may be communicated in the milk of cows. These conclusions are of the first importance and will serve to bring the whole subject again under discussion. If it be accepted that tuberculosis can be conveyed to infants in the milk of cows affected with the disease, heavy responsibility will rest upon the department of agriculture to take steps for the protection of the community from the peril to which it is thus exposed.

The New York Herald, whose weather notes have come to be accepted as reliable in an unusual degree, records the fact that the mean temperature in that city during August was 70 degrees as compared with an average of 73 for the month during the past 32 years and says, "it seems that the last month has been abnormally cool in most of the Atlantic states." The Herald concludes: "It is not, however, to be assumed that September's temperature will on the whole prove similarly deficient. While there is now no indication in any part of the country of the formation of severe heat waves, there is no indication of the premature arrival of killing frosts in the higher latitudes of the continent. As a rule, the first irruption of autumnal cold waves, even in the northwestern and northern sections of the country, rarely occurs until after the equinox, and this year is not likely to be an exception."
