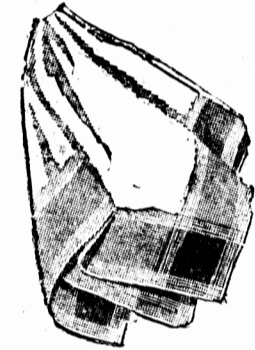

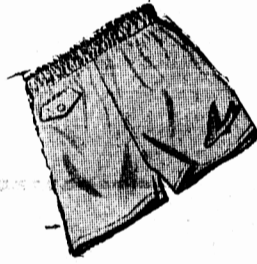

## St. Thomas Anglican Church

Stephen's) was built. Mr. Meek also held services at Long River, Third Pond (now Sea View), Baltic, Fermoy (now Spring Valley) and occasionally at Cavendish, also at Springfield which was vacant at that time. Finally the work became too strenuous for this able and devoted man and he moved to Sydney Mines where the remainder of his life was spent. He died there in 1870. It is recorded on his tombstone that "His sole aim was the glory of God and the welfare of souls committed to his care."

The congregation of New London may well remember with gratitude the many labours and unremitting devotion of Rev. William Meek. He successfully carried on the Church's work in a place that had never in any time been easy. It is indeed as it should be that his descendants of the same name are still active in the work of St. Thomas' Church in this year 1948.

In the burial ground there are many old monuments and head stones, among them a monument to Thomas Billing, his wife Theresa, and his son John; the inscription, now badly worn by wind and weather, is almost illegible. Another monument has an interesting inscription which reads as follows: "In memory of Francis Pillman of French River, New London, died December 17th, 1853, aged 86 years. A native of Exeter, England, he emigrated to this place in 1812 after serving as a seaman in the ship Minotaur and was at the battle of the Nile." Mr. Thomas Cole has been the efficient and painstaking caretaker of St. Thomas' cemetery for many years.

In the D. C. S. report of 1859 it is recorded that an unknown friend in Jersey had generously presented a silver Communion service, communion linen and hangings for the pulpit and service books. These Communion vessels are still in use.

After Mr. Meek's departure the mission remained vacant for nearly a year. Occasional services were given by Archdeacon Read of St. Eleanor's. In 1864 the D. C. S. report contained the following statement: "They (the committee) are anxious to record the ordination of Mr. James Arminius Richey to the office of Deacon by Bishop Alley of Nova Scotia during His Majesty's last visit to the Island. This truly Scriptural and Apostolic rite was solemnized in New London Parish Church on Sunday, August, 2nd, 1863, when a concourse of persons, many of whom had travelled miles to be present on the occasion, were witnesses of that solemn form - the imposition of the hands of the Chief Pastor of the Church by which the Church recognizes those as her ministers whom Christ Himself has called, and on whom she thus confers authority to do the work of an evangelist in the House of God."

In Mr. Richey's first report to the D. C. S. he spoke of the large and devout congregation especially in Irishtown and stated that at New London the parishioners hoped to be assisted in the erection of a new church as the old one was falling into decay. In 1866 he told of increasing congregations in New London. In 1867 Mr. Richey left the parish and the Island.

Rev. Joseph Churchill Cox was the next in charge. In his first report to the D. C. S. he spoke of the kindness of the people in helping him get settled and that he had been presented with a sledge. He commenced Bible classes and hoped they would be beneficial to the young in leading them to a better knowledge of the Scriptures. In his second report he said "Nothing has been done toward repairing the old church. A difference of opinion existing whether to repair the old church or build a new one."

In 1873 Mr. Cox reported that some steps had been taken towards the erection of a new church upon the old site. A public tea party had been held in June and \$200 realized. He also said "Acting on the advice of the Bishop he had left the building of the new church entirely with St. Thomas' congregation who in reference to this matter had maintained a strong determination to proceed in accordance with their own plans and purposes." In 1874 Mr. Cox left the Parish.

Rev. O. S. Newnham took charge in 1875 and reported the new Church now commenced, the people working with a will. Another tea party had been held and \$420 realized. The average church attendance that year was 130. The new St. Thomas Church, which cost \$1,200, was opened for Divine service in January 1875. Rev. David Fitzgerald of Charlottetown was the special preacher and although the church was crowded at both services. The Church was consecrated in May 1875 by Bishop Binney with a debt of only \$40 on it. The building however did not have a tower or spire; it was not until 1880 that money was raised for that purpose and a bell procured.

Mr. Newnham moved to St. John's in 1878 and Rev. T. B. Reagh became Rector in 1879. Mr. Reagh spent ten years in the parish as its much respected and beloved Rector. After his removal to Milton in 1890 Rev. Thomas Lloyd, a native of Wales was Rector for four years 1891-1896. After Mr. Lloyd the Rectors of the parish were as follows:

- Rev. J. A. Winfield, 1900-1905.
- Rev. A. W. Nicholls, 1905-1910.

- Rev. C. T. Spriggs, 1922-1933.
- Rev. B. Freeman, 1933-1942.
- Rev. H. E. Newman, 1942-1944.

Rev. D. E. Noel, 1944-1948.  
Rev. S. J. Davies, 1948-

A perusal of the parish register reveals many strange and unusual names—Who is there in this generation who can recall such names of people as Fowl, Pine, Freize, Kemble, Helm, Blagman, West, etc.—all these people lived in French River and vicinity and were married and had their children baptized in St. Thomas' Church.

St. Thomas' Church has a seating capacity of 180 and is an attractive cosy country Church kept orderly and neat as befits the House of God. On July 9th, 1947, Archbishop G. F. Kingston, now Primate of Canada, confirmed a class of twenty-one youths and adults, the largest class to be presented to the Bishop for many years, making a total of thirty-three confirmed during Mr. Noel's Rectorship. Mr. Noel concluded his term as Rector of New London Parish on April 4th, 1948. A large congregation was in attendance and many regrets expressed at his departure.

Between April 4th and May 16th when Mr. Davies took charge, a group of men of the congregation held services each Sunday showing their keen interest and great love for their Church. Now under Mr. Davies' leadership it is hoped that
