KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

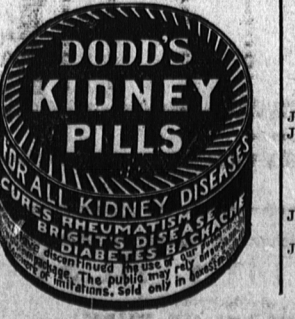
