Cardinal McGuigan Pays Visit To Quebec

QUEBEC, May 26.—(CP)—Cardinal McGuigan, Archbishop of Toronto, arrived at nearby Lévis Saturday for his first official visit to historic Quebec.

The population of the town facing Quebec across the St. Lawrence River greeted the Cardinal at the station and a welcome address was read by Rev. J. A. Bégin. An official party from Quebec, including Cardinal Villeneuve, Archbishop of Quebec, and Mayor Lucien Borne, met the Cardinal aboard a special ferry and took him back to Wolfe's Cove here.

The party proceeded to the historic Heights of Abraham to join a special parade taking Cardinal McGuigan to the Archbishop's palace. Participating in the parade were the cadet corps of St. Patrick School, the Guards Charnelais, Jeanne D'Arc, St. Jean Baptiste, Laval, Commercial Academy, the Patrons of Laval, St. Roch and Quebec, the Pontifical Zouaves and the Royal 22nd Regiment.

An official religious welcome was then held in the upper town Basilica adjoining the Archbishop's palace. Cardinal Villeneuve officiated.

Today the Toronto Archbishop attended a pontifical high mass in the Basilica with Cardinal Villeneuve. In the afternoon, the city tendered an official welcome to the Cardinal in the city-owned Palais Montcalm.

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The Bishop made a world tour in 1927 and went to Canada three times.

"Everyman Library" Series Editor Dies

LONDON, May 26.—(Reuters)—Ernest Rhys, 87, author, poet and editor of the 1,000-volume "Everyman Library" series, died Saturday in London.

In his youth, Mr. Rhys left a Durham coal pit to seek his living as a writer in London. Starving in a garret, he was mistaken by publishers' representatives for an Oxford scholar of the same name and asked to edit a series of books. Having persuaded the publishers to give him a chance at the job even if he was not the man they had sought originally, Mr. Rhys produced the successful camelot series and was given steady employment as an editor.

Among books of his own authorship were "Wales and the English" and "England and Wales" which appeared in 1940.

Four Drowned While Fishing

OHIO, May 26.—(AP)—Four persons, including an army officer just returned from overseas, and his wife were drowned tonight while fishing in the Saguenay River opposite Erie city of the Lake St. John region.

The victims were: Capt. Yvon Auellet, his wife, the former Yvonne DesGagne, Armand Ouellet and Patrick Harvey, all of Ohio.

A fifth member of the party, P. K. Simard, clung to the small craft and was saved.

Simard said the group had set out to fish on the opposite side of the Saguenay River, travelling in a 16-foot canvas canoe. The boat was heavily loaded, he said, and proved inadequate to meet the rough waves, for it suddenly overturned.

Seeding Resumed in Prairie Provinces. WINNIPEG, May 26.—Resumption of seeding following delays occasioned by the week previously, is rapidly bringing seeding of the current crop to completion in most sections. The frost damage was less than anticipated and only at a few points will re-seeding on coarse grains be required. According to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railways.
