But others object that in '03 the steamers on that line were 64 days in the ice and that in '05 they were 69 days locked up. Every year Pictou harbor is full of icebergs. The only practical route is the Cape George and Georgetown way, because, explains W. Chisholm, M. P. for Antigonish, in a philippic delivered at Ottawa against the Tunnel and Tormentine and Pictou, there are two tides around Cape George, the Northern Island and Canso tides, which between them keep the icebergs on the move and the route clear. A delegation is going to Ottawa to have the steamers shifted to the new route and to have a spur laid from the main line of the Intercolonial down to Cape George."


