Expected Bank Bandits Taken

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 3.—Two men believed by the police to be members of the gang which robbed the Niagara Trust Company at Niagara Falls yesterday were arrested here today.

One of the prisoners, the police say, recently was released from prison at Mansfield, Ohio. He gave his name as Russell Battaglia, 24 years of age, of Niagara Falls. His companion said he was Peter Ortolano of Buffalo.

CAREFUL SELECTION LESSENS BROODINESS

Broody hens, like wayward children, are a great discredit to their parents and a source of annoyance to all who have to do with them. That is why one of the greatest secrets of every ambitious and enthusiastic poultryman is to restrict the appearance and development of broodiness in his flock. Broodiness can be reduced very markedly by careful, rigid, and persistent selection.

In the Massachusetts experiment station, where a detailed experimental study of broodiness has been made, it was ascertained that previous to the practice of selection the average hen in the flock was broody 3.85 times a year. After pair-picking selection was practiced for five years, this tendency to broodiness was reduced so that the average egg producer in the flock developed broodiness only 0.26 times a year. A study of the correlations between broodiness and egg production shows that pullets that are very broody tend to lay relatively few eggs between their broody periods.

There is no one dominant cause of broodiness among poultry. Genetically, there occur four distinct types of nonbroodiness and one of broodiness. It is believed that this showing only a slight tendency to broodiness belongs to the same class as the nonbroody fowls, as each has about the same proportion of broody offspring. The determination of broodiness is complicated by the fact that birds that are not broody during the pullet year may become broody during their season of third laying season.

Shots Fied in Milk Strike

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—New York's metropolitan area, suddenly cut off today from its milk supply by a strike of more than 10,000 wagon drivers and platform men, tonight was still without normal deliveries and indications were that the situation tomorrow would be just as bad.

Progress towards an early settlement was made late today, however, at a three-hour conference called by Mayor Haylan when committees representing the union and the distributors agreed to confer tomorrow.

Shortly after the New York milk conference board had announced it would seek to have the milk supply at outlying stations protected by the state constabulary, the first violence of the strike was reported. After a running fight in which several shots were fired the police arrested two men, charged with overturning a greener's push cart containing bottled milk and striking him on the head with a milk bottle.

The day's distribution was confined to hospitals and other institutions requiring an imperative daily supply. Union men have agreed to continue such deliveries.

Rescue Starving Men Marooned

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 3.—The northeast gale which has swept this section of Newfoundland since Friday evening, abated today. Half a million dollars damage has been done to roads, and public property, it is estimated, in addition to the loss of private property swept away or destroyed. Beyond one death in St. John's from electrocution, no toll of life from the storm is known, but it is feared that loss of life at sea was inevitable. No word has yet been heard from the small schooner which was blown out to
